Swachhata Pakhwada	 Why in news? The Ministry of Development of North Eastern Region (MDoNER) has taken a significant step towards promoting cleanliness and environmental sustainability with the launch of Swachhata Pakhwada. Initiative: Swachhata Pakhwada is a cleanliness campaign initiated by the Government of India. Objective: The campaign aims to promote cleanliness and sanitation across the country. Launch Year: April 2016. Duration: The campaign runs for a fortnight (14 days) in different ministries and departments. Focus Areas: Activities include cleanliness drives, waste management, and spreading awareness about hygiene practices. Involvement: Various government departments, public sector undertakings (PSUs), and educational institutions actively participate in Swachhata Pakhwada. Monitoring: Ministries and departments are required to upload action plans and achievements on the Swachhata Pakhwada portal. Themes: Each ministry or department focuses on specific themes related to cleanliness and sanitation during their designated period. Impact: The initiative aims to instill a sense of responsibility towards cleanliness and contribute to the broader Swachh Bharat Abhiyan (Clean India Mission).
PREFIRE Mission	 Why in news? NASA is undertaking a polar mission to enhance understanding of the Arctic and Antarctic regions. The mission aims to study how these regions are shedding heat upward into space.
	About PREFIRE Mission: ■ The Polar Radiant Energy in the Far-InfraRed Experiment (PREFIRE) polar mission involves twin satellites, each equipped with one instrument. ■ These satellites measure the poles approximately six







	 hours apart. The objective of the PREFIRE mission is to reveal the full spectrum of heat loss from Earth's polar regions for the first time, which will help make climate models more accurate. The aim of the PREFIRE mission is to fill the gap in knowledge and provide data to improve predictions of climate change and sea level rise. The mission will provide new information on how Earth's atmosphere and ice influence the amount of heat being radiated out to space from the Arctic and Antarctic.
Digital Arrest	 Why in news? There have been increasing reports of "digital arrests" by cybercriminals. The Central government has collaborated with Microsoft to tackle this issue. More than 1,000 Skype IDs have been blocked. These IDs were used for online intimidation, blackmail, and extortion.
	 About Digital Arrest: Cybercriminals have employed a new and innovative tactic to defraud victims and extort money. The modus operandi involves fraudsters posing as law enforcement officials such as police, Enforcement Directorate, CBI, etc. They manipulate victims into believing that they have committed some serious crime. In some cases, victims are "digitally arrested" and forced to stay visible over Skype or other video conferencing platforms until the criminals' demands are met. The cybercriminals deceive the victim into believing that they are under 'digital arrest' and will be prosecuted if they do not pay a large sum of money. Often, the cybercriminals trick the victims into self-arrest or self-quarantine, making them believe that they are under 'digital arrest' and cannot leave their house unless they pay up.
Lunar Polar Exploration Mission (LUPEX)	 Why in news? The India-Japan partnership is planning a joint moon mission called Lunar Polar Exploration Mission (LUPEX). The primary objective of LUPEX is to explore the lunar surface and search for subsurface water.
	About LUPEX:







	 Objective: To explore the polar regions of the Moon, specifically targeting the lunar poles. Mission Type: Robotic exploration mission. Primary Goals: Investigate the presence of water ice and other volatiles in the lunar polar regions. Study the topography, geology, and composition of the lunar poles. Assess the suitability of these regions for future human exploration and potential
International Court of Justice (ICJ)	Why in news? The United Nations' top court, the International Court of Justice, started hearings on the Israeli military's incursion into Rafah. The hearings were initiated by a request from South Africa. South Africa alleges that Israel's military action in its war with Hamas in Gaza amounts to genocide. About ICJ: Establishment: The ICJ was established in 1945 by the Charter of the United Nations and began its work in April 1946. Location: It is headquartered in the Peace Palace in The Hague, Netherlands. Function: The ICJ is the principal judicial organ of the United Nations. It settles legal disputes between states and gives advisory opinions on international legal issues referred to it by the UN. Composition: The court is composed of 15 judges elected to nine-year terms by the United Nations General Assembly and Security Council. No two judges can be from the same country. Languages: The official languages of the ICJ are English and French. Jurisdiction: The ICJ has jurisdiction in two types of cases: Contentious Cases: Legal disputes between states submitted by them. Advisory Opinions: Legal questions referred to it by duly authorized international organs and agencies.

Unnathi Startup City programme	 Why in news? The second batch of the Unnathi Startup City programme is set to begin. Kerala Startup Mission (KSUM) has invited expressions of interest from ST community entrepreneurs for the funding scheme under the Unnathi programme. The Unnathi Startup City programme is a joint initiative of the Kerala Startup Mission (KSUM) and the Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes Development department. The programme is designed to promote innovators, entrepreneurs, and start-ups from Scheduled Tribe (ST) communities. Unnathi, works towards the betterment of the lesser privileged sections, focusing on the educational, professional, and entrepreneurial advancement of the SC/ST youth. The Unnathi Startup City is proposed to be developed in the capital to provide incubation facilities and support for entrepreneurial ventures promoted by members of SC/ST communities in multiple sectors. Eligibility: Individuals, groups and ST start-ups registered under the KSUM are eligible to apply for the loan-based funding programme, of which 80% of the amount will be sanctioned by the Scheduled Tribes Development department. The remaining 20% of the investment amount can be taken from the Kerala State Scheduled Tribes Corporation or bank. The project will be implemented through the Kerala Empowerment Society.
Kerala State Disaster Management Authority (KSDMA)	 Why in news? The Kerala State Heat Action Plan, first published in 2020, is currently being revised and updated. The revision aims to make the plan more relevant, comprehensive, and inclusive.
	 Key points: The updated plan, referred to as the Kerala State HAP 2.0. The Kerala State Disaster Management Authority







(KSDMA), which drafted the original plan, is responsible
for its revision.

About KSDMA:

- **Established:** KSDMA was established under the Disaster Management Act, 2005.
- **Function**: The primary function of KSDMA is to formulate disaster management policies, plans, and guidelines for the state of Kerala.
- Chairperson: The Chief Minister of Kerala is the ex-officio Chairperson of KSDMA.
- **Vice-Chairperson**: The Vice-Chairperson is the Minister for Revenue and Disaster Management.
- **Executive Committee**: The Authority has an Executive Committee headed by the Chief Secretary of Kerala.

Operation Clean

Why in news?

The Ernakulam Rural police have registered 145 cases under the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic **Substances Act** in the past six months.

Key points:

- These cases were registered under the drive **Operation** Clean, a strategic campaign aimed at identifying and neutralising major threats and players associated with organised crime.
- The campaign prioritised action against smuggling, peddling, and consumption of drugs.
- The campaign was launched as a continuation of 'Yodhav,' a project launched by the State Police in **2022** to eliminate the production, use, and trafficking of drugs in Kerala.

Vizhinjam port

Why in news?

- A seminar on 'Port Development and Employment' inaugurated.
- This seminar was organised in connection with the **58th** State conference of the Kerala Gazetted Officers' Association (KGOA).

Key points:

- The Vizhinjam port, once operational, will set the stage for the development of various ports across the State, including Kollam.
- It was suggested that the State should make extensive preparations for the opening of the port.

About Vizhinjam International Seaport:

The Vizhinjam International Seaport is a significant port development project in Thiruvananthapuram,



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	 Kerala. It is India's first deep-water container transshipment port. The port is designed to cater primarily to container transshipment, multi-purpose, and break bulk cargo. The port is being developed in a landlord model with a Public Private Partnership component on a design, build, finance, operate, and transfer (DBFOT) basis. The port is strategically located just 10 nautical miles from the busy international shipping route connecting Europe, the Persian Gulf, and the Far East.
Kerala Anti-social Activities (Prevention) Act (KAAPA)	 Why in news? The Kochi City police have externed two habitual offenders under the Kerala Anti-social Activities (Prevention) Act (KAAPA). About KAAPA: Purpose: The Kerala Anti-social Activities (Prevention) Act (KAAPA) is aimed at preventing and controlling anti-social activities in the state of Kerala. Enactment Year: KAAPA was enacted in the year 2007. Scope: The act targets habitual offenders and individuals involved in anti-social activities, including criminal activities that disrupt public order. Preventive Detention: KAAPA allows for the preventive detention of individuals deemed to be involved in anti-social activities. This means individuals can be detained without trial for a specified period to prevent them from committing further crimes. Detention Period: Initially, an individual can be detained for up to 6 months. This period can be extended up to one year with the approval of the Advisory Board. Advisory Board: An Advisory Board, consisting of a retired High Court judge and two other members, reviews detention orders and decides on the necessity of extending the detention period.

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
