Why in news?

 The State government's initiative to make expensive cancer drugs and immunosuppressant drugs available at zero-profit price to consumers is being launched.

Key Points:

- Cancer drugs, also known as chemotherapy drugs, are medications that treat cancer by killing fast-growing cells in the body.
- Cancer cells grow and multiply much faster than most other cells, so chemotherapy is often used to treat cancer.
- Immunosuppressants are drugs that prevent your immune system from attacking healthy cells and tissues by mistake.
- Healthcare providers prescribe immunosuppressants to treat certain autoimmune diseases and prevent organ or stem cell transplant rejection.

Key Points:

- An **endangered species** is a plant or animal that's **so rare that it's at risk of becoming extinct** in all or a large part of its range.
- The Endangered Species Act (ESA) lists species as endangered or threatened.
- A species is considered threatened if it's likely to become endangered in the near future.

Primary Amoebic Meningoencephalitis (PAM)	Why in news? • Recently, Kerala has decided to invest in research on the 'One Health' platform to study primary amoebic meningoencephalitis (PAM).
	 Key Points: It is caused by Naegleria fowleri, free-living amoebae in warm, stagnant freshwater and has a high mortality rate (>97%). It is known as the "brain-eating amoeba," it infects the brain through the nasal passages, leading to severe brain tissue destruction. Children are particularly vulnerable, though it does not spread from person to person or through swallowing contaminated water. Symptoms: Symptoms include headache, fever, nausea, and vomiting. Treatment: The optimal drug regimen is still uncertain, and treatment involves a multidisciplinary team.
Places in news: Churulipetti	 Why in news? Kerala's Churulipetti holds remnants of Sikkari Kuttiyamma's settlement. Key Points: Churulipetti village inside the Chinnar Wildlife Sanctuary in Idukki is the location where Kerala's first woman hunter Sikkari Kuttiyamma set up a settlement and lived for nearly three decades. Kuttiyamma, who belonged to the Vattavayalil family in Pala, was a woman hunter and settled in Churulipetti with her father and brothers in the 1960s.

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
