CMFRI's research on India's marine biodiversity displayed at UN meet

- Research findings of the ICAR-Central Marine Fisheries Research Institute (CMFRI) on India's marine ecosystems were showcased at UN Meet.
- United Nations meeting was held at Seoul, South Korea to discuss the Global Biodiversity Framework.

Key points

- India emphasized its commitment to marine ecosystem conservation, particularly mangroves and coral reefs, the identification of marine protected areas, and the promotion of sustainable marine fishing.
- India emphasized about the Sustainable Ocean Initiative (SOI) workshop, which is aimed to accelerate the implementation of the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework (KMGBF) of the UN Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD).
- The report highlighted CMFRI's research in developing a deep learning-enabled image recognition model for classifying underwater coral images as part of efforts to restore ocean ecosystems.
- It also mentioned CMFRI's attempts to map the spatial distribution of aquatic invasive species in the northern Indian Ocean region.

Did you know?

 SOI is a global platform that seeks to build partnerships and enhance capacity to achieve global goals and targets related to marine and coastal biodiversity.

CBI does not require permission to probe pre-2014 cases too: SC

- A Constitution Bench held that a Supreme Court judgment of 2014 which declared invalid a legal provision mandating the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) to take prior permission before investigating corruption cases against senior government officials has a retrospective effect. Key points
- A five-judge Bench headed by Justice Sanjay Kishan Kaul said the provision in question, Section 6A of the Delhi Special Police Establishment (DSPE) Act, the statute that governs the CBI, was void from the very day of its insertion on September 11, 2003.
- The 106-page judgment held that Section 6A violated fundamental rights, and once a law is declared to be unconstitutional, being violative of Part-III (fundamental rights) of the Constitution, then it would be held to be void ab initio, still born, unenforceable and non est
- This means that senior government officials involved in corruption cases even before the date of the Supreme Court judgment invalidating the need for prior sanction would no longer be able to avail the protection of prior approval.

Series of disruptive weather and climate phenomenon occurring in India linked to food security

El Nino-Southern Oscillation (ENSO) cycle.

- El Nino and La Nina are complex weather patterns resulting from variations in ocean temperatures in the Equatorial Pacific Region. They are opposite phases of what is known as the El Nino-Southern Oscillation (ENSO) cycle.
- The ENSO cycle describes the fluctuations in temperature between the ocean and atmosphere in the east-central Equatorial Pacific.
- El Nino and La Nina episodes typically last nine to 12 months, but some prolonged events may last for years.

El-Nino

- El Nino is a climate pattern that describes the unusual warming of surface waters in the eastern tropical Pacific Ocean.
- It is the "warm phase" of a larger phenomenon called the El Nino-Southern Oscillation (ENSO).
- It occurs more frequently than La Nina.
- El Niño is a loose translation of "little boy" or "Christ child" in Spanish.
- El Niño is the warming of sea waters in Central-east Equatorial Pacific that occurs every few years (Warm phase off the coast of Peru).
- During El Niño, surface temperatures in the equatorial Pacific rise
- This weakens the trade winds east-west winds that blow near the Equator.
- Due to El Niño, easterly trade winds that blow from the Americas towards Asia change direction to turn into westerlies.
- It thus brings warm water from the western Pacific towards America







Special Session to discuss Parliament's 75-year journey, take up Bills on CEC, the Press

- There will be a discussion on "Parliamentary journey of 75 years starting from Samvidhan Sabha achievements, experiences, memories and learnings".
- The agenda indicates a plan to shift to the new Parliament building.
- Three Bills will be taken up:
 - a) the Post Office Bill, 2023 to "consolidate and amend the law relating to Post Office in India";
 - b) the Chief Election Commissioner and Other Election Commissioners (Appointment, Conditions of Service and Term of Office) Bill, to "regulate the appointment, conditions of service and term of office of the Chief Election Commissioner and Other Election Commissioners"; and
 - c) the Repealing and Amending Bill, 2023 to "repeal certain enactments and to amend an enactment".
- In addition to these, the Lok Sabha will take up the Advocates (Amendment) Bill, 2023, and the Press and Registration of Periodicals Bill, 2023.

Activists raise concerns over legal loophole pertaining to sexual assault of animals

 Animal rights activists across India have expressed their concern at the absence of any provision to address sexual crimes against animals in the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS), 2023 Bill that seeks to repeal the Indian Penal Code (IPC), 1860.

Key points

- While the 2018 judgment removing portions of Section 377 of the IPC decriminalised sex between consenting same-gender adults, it did not address the question of bestiality.
- Currently, Section 377 of the IPC provides for punishment of those found engaging in bestiality.
- It states, "Whoever voluntarily has carnal intercourse against the order of nature with any man, woman or animal, shall be punished with imprisonment for life, or with imprisonment of either description for a term which may extend to ten years, and shall also be liable to fine."

Note: The meaning of BESTIALITY is sexual relations between a human being and a lower animal.

National Centre for Disease Control (NCDC)

 A Central team of officials from NCDC is expected to visit Maruthonkara and Ayancheri areas in Kozhikode district of Kerala where two persons died due to Nipah infection recently.

Key points

National Centre for Disease Control (NCDC):

- It is an institute under the Indian Directorate General of Health Services, Ministry of Health and Family Welfare.
- The Director, an officer of the Public Health sub-cadre of Central Health Service, is the administrative and technical head of the Institute.
- Headquarters: New Delhi.

 It functions as the nodal agency in the country for disease surveillance facilitating prevention and control of communicable diseases.

Constitution articles dealing with language

- Union Home Minister Amit Shah said that simple and clear Hindi words should be used in office work, adding that the principle of language change says that "language moves from complexity to simplicity".
- The Minister said that the Hindi language had played an unprecedented role in uniting the country during the difficult days of the Independence movement, instilled a feeling of unity in a country divided into many languages and dialects, and played an important role in carrying the freedom struggle from east to west and north to south in the country.

Key points

- Article 343 of the Indian Constitution talks about the Official language of the Union
- Article 344 talks about Commission and Committee of Parliament on official language

SC joins National Judicial Data Grid

- Real-time data on the filing and disposal of cases in the Supreme Court will now be available at the fingertips of the common man, just a click of a mouse away.
- Chief Justice of India D.Y. Chandrachud announced the onboarding of the Supreme Court on the National Judicial Data Grid (NJDG)

Key points

- The NJDG portal is a national repository of data relating to cases instituted, pending and disposed of by the courts across the length and breadth of the country.
- The onboarding of Supreme Court's case data on the NJDG is based on the 'open data policy'.
- Data will be uploaded on the NJDG on a real-time and daily basis.

All reported births, deaths to be digitally registered from Oct. 1

 All reported births and deaths in the country will be digitally registered on the Centre's portal from October 1, 2023.

Key points

- The Registration of Births and Deaths (Amendment) Act, 2023 that paves the way for digital birth certificates will come into effect from October 1.
- The digital birth certificates will be a single document to be used for admission to educational institutions, applications for driving licence, government jobs, passports or Aadhaar, voter enrolment, and registration of marriage, and others.
- The centralised database will also update the National Population Register (NPR), ration cards, property registration, and electoral rolls.

National Population Register (NPR) and Census National Population Register (NPR):

• The National Population Register (NPR) is a register of usual residents of the country.



- It includes both Indian citizens as well as a foreign citizen.
- According to the Citizenship (Registration of Citizens and issue of National Identity Cards) Rules, 2003, a usual resident is a person who has resided in a local area for the past 6 months or more or a person who intends to reside in that area for the next 6 months or more.
- It is being prepared at the local (Village/sub-Town), sub-District, District, State and National level under provisions of the Citizenship Act 1955 and the Citizenship (Registration of Citizens and issue of National Identity Cards) Rules, 2003
- The Census is the enumeration of the population of the country and it is being conducted at an interval of 10 years

NPR vs Census

- The decennial census is the largest single source of a variety of statistical information on the different characteristics of the people of India.
- While NPR only contains demographic information, more details are required for the census like information on demography, economic activity, literacy and education, and housing and household amenities among others.

India vs Bharat controversy

- In dinner invitations sent to G-20 summit guests had carried the nomenclature of the President of India as 'President of Bharat'.
- Government critics have alleged that Modi's Govt is planning to change the name to only Bharat.

Key points:

- Article 1 says, "India, that is Bharat, shall be a Union of States".
- Parliament has the absolute power to change the name of the country at any time by amending the Constitution.
- Article 368 deals with the Constitutional Amendment.
 Did you know?
- Article 52 says that there shall be a President of India.
 Therefore, constitutionally speaking, there is no President of Bharat in the country.
- The word 'Bharat' is not used in any of the articles of the Constitution except in the Hindi version, which was published under the authority of the President under Article 394A.
- Article 1 in the Hindi translation of the Constitution says "Bharat means India", which shows that Bharat is treated as the translation of India.

Maharashtra State News

Mumbai-Ahmedabad bullet train project

- National High Speed Rail Corporation Ltd (NHSRCL) is implementing the Mumbai-Ahmedabad bullet train project.
- The land for the project is spread over three districts Thane, Palghar and Mumbai Suburban in Maharashtra.

- The 508 km-long Mumbai-Ahmedabad bullet train project is the pet project of Prime Minister Narendra Modi.
- National High Speed Rail Corporation Ltd (NHSRCL), a joint venture of the central government and participating state governments, is implementing the project.

Thane depot of bullet train project to be built on Japan's Shinkansen depots' standards

- The Thane depot is one of the three depots planned for the Mumbai-Ahmedabad bullet train project.
- The Thane depot, to be designed on the lines of the Japanese Shinkansen depots.
- The Shinkansen, also known as the bullet train in Japan, is famous for its high-speed rail technology and safety standards.

Dhangars' long-pending quota demand


- Dhangars' long-pending quota demand remains a complex issue in Maharashtra.
- The Dhangars, who account for up to 9% of the population and get 3.5% reservation, have been demanding inclusion in the ST category
- The community has for the past several decades been fighting for reservation under the Scheduled Tribe category.

Climate Change impact on Maharashtra

- Climate change: Maharashtra's extreme temperatures, rainfall, cyclones rise 1.5 times more than average
- The climate change has triggered the temperatures across Maharashtra almost three times the usual over 24 days with the overall summer-monsoon (June to August) season witnessing a rise of 1.5 times the average climate activities such as rainfall and wind triggered by the heat.
- The overall departure of long-term average temperature during the season was 0.8 degrees celsius i.e nearly one degree above (0.2 degrees less)

₹837 Crore Project To Deal With Cyber Crimes in MH

 The project aims to bring all modern technologies under one umbrella, which will also include a control and command center, technology-assisted investigation, a center of excellence, a Computer Emergency Response Team, a cloud-based data center, a security operations center





 Under this project, people can register their complaints on a 24x7 call center, according to the decision passed by the state cabinet.

International Literacy Day 2023

 On the occasion of International Literacy Day, Rotary Club Osmanabad distributed the 'Rashtra Prachikar Award' 2023-24 at Rotary Eye Hospital.

Key points:

- It is observed on 8th September.
- UNESCO in November 1966, formally designated September 8th as International Literacy Day.
- The observance of ILD aims to reinforce public opinion in support of the ongoing endeavours against illiteracy.
- International Literacy Day 2023 will be celebrated under the theme "Promoting literacy for a world in transition: Building the foundation for sustainable and peaceful societies".

National Lok Adalat in Mumbai

- National Lok Adalat in Mumbai awards ₹722 cr. to over 12,000 cases.
- National Lok Adalat has awarded over ₹722 crore by settling more than 12,000 cases here.
- The cases included compoundable criminal offenses, cheque bouncing as well as matters under the Payment and Settlement Act. A total settlement amount of ₹722,82,71,891 was distributed to 12,472 cases.

Did you know?

- National Lok Adalat (NLA) is a forum for amicable settlement of disputes at national level.
- It is organized by the National Legal Services Authority (NALSA) in collaboration with the State Legal Services Authorities (SLSAs) and District Legal Services Authorities (DLSAs).

Pune, Pimpri Chinchwad register 30% of all EV sales in state.

- Pune and Pimpri Chinchwad now have around 30% of the total number of electric vehicles (EVs) registered in the state, data from the ministry of road transportation.
- In addition, a significant increase has also been seen in the registration of CNG vehicles in the twin cities.
- Around 95,000 of the 3,22,225 EVs registered in the state are in Pune and Pimpri Chinchwad alone.

Rs 4,500 crore plan to empower Thane with 24-hour power

- A plan has been drawn to upgrade the power distribution system with a budget of Rs4,500 crore for uninterrupted and round-the-clock power supply to Thane district, said union minister Kapil Patil.
- Under the plan, the power distribution network will be strengthened in the 850 villages of Thane district.
- Work worth Rs1,200 crore will be done in the first two years and the remaining will be completed in next five years.

IIT Council ties up with American univ assn to form research institute


- With a seed fund of \$10 million, the IIT Council on behalf of all higher educational institutes in India has entered into an MoU with the Association of American Universities (AAU) to establish the Indo-US Global Challenges Institute.
- The intent of the institute was announced in June this year, during the US visit of PM Modi.
- This institute will seek to address some of the "consequential" economic, environmental and technological challenges "that have the potential to affect the security, prosperity, and stability of both countries."


National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC)

- The poor response from universities in Maharashtra to their participation in National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) has got the state education department taking a serious view about its implementation.
- Director of higher and technical education in Maharashtra Shailendra Deolankar had sent three reminders to universities in Maharashtra to submit data about colleges that have been poor in responding to the NAAC gradation which was also not submitted by the universities

About NAAC:

- The NATIONAL ASSESSMENT AND ACCREDITATION COUNCIL (NAAC) conducts assessment and accreditation of Higher Educational Institutions (HEI) such as colleges, universities or other recognised institutions to derive an understanding of the 'Quality Status' of the institution.
- NAAC evaluates the institutions for its conformance to the standards of quality in terms of its performance related to the educational processes and outcomes, curriculum coverage, teaching-learning processes, faculty, research, infrastructure, learning resources, organisation, governance, financial well being and student services.







Vultures breeding: 50 captive vultures will be released in the wild soon

- Over the next one year, 50 captive vultures will be released in the wild in Maharashtra, Rajasthan and Madhya Pradesh.
- These vultures are part of the 650 that have been bred over the last 20 years at four Conservation Breeding Centres by the Bombay Natural History Society (BNHS) with funding by the Royal Society for Protection of Birds, UK, and later by the state forest department where the centers are located.

Did you know?

- The chief cause for the decline in vulture population was the use of diclofenac injections in cattle.
- The Panna tiger reserve has a large number of wild vultures.

BNHS members explore Amboli's Biodiversity and Bioluminescent Fungus

 Bombay Natural History Society (BNHS) recently discovered hundreds of species of native plants in a small forest patch in Devrai (Sacred Groves) near Amboli.

Key points:

- BNHS members spotted endemic herpetofauna, including the Malabar Pit Viper, Amboli Bush Frog, Malabar Gliding Frog, and the Critically Endangered Amboli Tiger Toad.
- They witnessed bioluminescent fungus during one of the night trails.

Bombay Natural History Society (BNHS)

- It is a Non-Governmental Organisation in India engaged in conservation and biodiversity research.
- It was founded on 15 September 1883.
- BNHS is the partner of BirdLife International in India.
 It has been designated as a 'Scientific and Industrial Research Organisation' by the Department of Science and Technology.
- Logo: The BNHS logo is the great hornbill.
- Internet of Birds platform: IT consultancy firm Accenture
 and the Bombay Natural History Society have developed
 Internet of Birds platform that identifies bird species
 found in India using Artificial Intelligence technology,
 including machine learning and computer vision, from
 digital photos that are uploaded by the public.

Constitutional Provisions Governing Reservation in India

- States do not have authority to grant reservation, says Maharashtra education minister.
- Maharashtra education minister Deepak Kesarkar said the issue of reservation was related to the Constitution and the states did not have much authority to grant quotas.

Let us understand the Constitutional Provisions governing Reservation in India:

 Part XVI deals with reservation of SC and ST in Central and State legislatures.

- Article 15(4) and 16(4) of the Constitution enabled the State and Central Governments to reserve seats in government services for the members of the SC and ST.
- The Constitution was amended by the Constitution (77th Amendment) Act, 1995 and a new clause (4A) was inserted in Article 16 to enable the government to provide reservation in promotion.
- Later, clause (4A) was modified by the Constitution (85th Amendment) Act, 2001 to provide consequential seniority to SC and ST candidates promoted by giving reservation.
- Constitutional 81st Amendment Act, 2000 inserted Article 16 (4 B) which enables the state to fill the unfilled vacancies of a year which are reserved for SCs/STs in the succeeding year, thereby nullifying the ceiling of fifty percent reservation on total number of vacancies of that year.
- Article 330 and 332 provides for specific representation through reservation of seats for SCs and STs in the Parliament and in the State Legislative Assemblies respectively
- Article 243D provides reservation of seats for SCs and STs in every Panchayat.
- Article 233T provides reservation of seats for SCs and STs in every Municipality.
- Article 335 of the constitution says that the claims of STs and STs shall be taken into consideration constituently with the maintenance of efficacy of the administration.

Gauray K.T Patil's Statue


- Gaurav K.T. Patil's statue was unveiled by Deputy CM, Devendraji Fadnavis.

- In this camp, 64 types of diseases will be examined free of charge.
- On this occasion, Swasthya Rath (Mobile Medical Unit) was also inaugurated.

Marathwada witnessed 685 farmers suicides in 2023

- 685 farmers ended their lives in Marathwada region in 2023.
- The district with the highest number of such incidents is Beed.

Did you know?

 Marathwada is an arid region in central Maharashtra consisting of eight districts Aurangabad, Jalna, Beed, Parbhani, Nanded, Osmanabad, Hingoli and Latur.

No takers for 19k RTE seats in state's private schools.

- Every year, there is a clamor for seats under the Right to Education (RTE) Act with lakhs applying for free admission in private schools.
- This year, nearly 19,000 seats under the 25% scheme are vacant in Maharashtra even though 3.64 lakh applications were received by the state education department for the 1.01 lakh seats.
- Education officials said that the vacant seats were in nonpopular schools and with government schools also providing quality education, many preferred to study there.

Did you know?

- The Right of Children to Free and Compulsory Education Act, 2009 (RTE Act) is an Act of the Parliament of India enacted on 4 August 2009.
- The Constitution (Eighty-sixth Amendment) Act, 2002 inserted Article 21-A in the Constitution of India to provide free and compulsory education of all children in the age group of six to fourteen years as a Fundamental Right.

The Kharif 2022 crop insurance case

 State Level Grievance Redressal Committee directed the Insurance Companies to deposit the remaining 350 crore rupees of Insurance to farmer's accounts.

Key points:

- The State Level Grievance Redressal Committee gave a judgment in favor of farmers in the Kharif 2022 crop Insurance case.
- The companies are reluctant to pay the amount.

 The Kharif 2022 crop insurance case is a legal case filed by a group of farmers in the Supreme Court of India challenging the Pradhan Mantri Fasal Bima Yojana (PMFBY).

Impulsive response to Multimedia Exposure

- Students participated in the digital multimedia exhibition organized on behalf of the Ministry of Information and Broadcasting, Central Bureau of Communications, Solapur and District Administration.
- The topic was 9 years of service to the Central Government, good governance and welfare of the poor and nutrition, food grains, youth, women, public representatives and citizens in large numbers.

Lok Adalat settles 58 cases

- At least 58 matters were settled, and compensation to the tune of Rs 3.5 crore was awarded in cases heard during the Lok Adalat organized in Maharashtra's Raigad district,
- Lok Adalat is a forum where disputes/cases pending in the court of law or at the pre-litigation stage are settled/compromised amicably.
- Lok Adalats have been given statutory status under the Legal Services Authorities Act, 1987.

NIA offers cash reward of Rs 3 lakh for information on ISIS Pune Module case suspects


- The National Investigation Agency (NIA) has offered a cash reward of Rs 3 lakh for each individual who provides information leading to the apprehension of four wanted accused individuals in the ISIS Pune module case.
- The accused persons have been identified as Mohmmed Shahnawaz Shafiuzzama Alam alias Abdulla, Rizwan Abdul Haji Ali, Abdulla Faiyaz Shaikh alias Diaperwala and Talha Liyakat Khan,

Did you know?

- The National Investigation Agency (NIA) is a central agency of India responsible for investigating and prosecuting terrorist activities, crimes against the nation, and offenses under the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act, 1967.
- It was established in 2008 in the wake of the 2008 Mumbai attacks.

Private hospital to combat drug resistant tuberculosis (DRTB)

- The Nagpur Municipal Corporation's (NMC's) pilot project involving a private hospital to combat growing cases of patients suffering from drug resistant tuberculosis (DRTB) is showing encouraging results with 18 persons being cured of the deadly disease within four months of its launch.
- The NMC had roped in Astha Critical Care Centre at Suyog Nagar to provide free services to DRTB patients who were shunned by even other overburdened and stressed public hospitals.



National Tuberculosis Elimination Program (NTEP):

- The NTEP is a government-led program that aims to eliminate tuberculosis (TB) in India by 2025.
- The program was launched in 1997 and has made significant progress in reducing the TB burden in India.
- In 2018, India accounted for 27% of the global TB burden, but only 10% of the global TB deaths.
- The NTEP is implemented by the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MoHFW) and works with state and district governments, as well as non-governmental organizations (NGOs).

Shyam Hotel to be converted into a monument for Dr. Ambedkar

 The Nagpur Metropolitan Region Development Authority (NMRDA) has now decided to take up the ambitious work of renovation of Shyam Hotel at Sitabuldi and convert it into a monument for Dr. Ambedkar.

Key points:

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- The project is titled as 'Bhimsrushti' and it involves strengthening the dilapidated structure and redoing the room in which Dr. Ambedkar stayed.
- The architect of the Indian constitution and messiah of dalits Bharat Ratna, Dr. Bhimrao Ambedkar stayed at Shyam Hotel when he came there for embracing Buddhism at Deekshabhoomi.

Water literacy lessons for 200 villages with aquifer mapping

• The aquifer mapping of 200 villages in Maharashtra project is launched at the Gokhale Institute of Economics and Politics (GIPE), Pune.

Kev Points:

- It is a part of Mission Easy Water Literacy and hopes to address water scarcity and drought-related challenges.
- This initiative is a collaboration between the Dr Dhananjayrao Gadgil Centre for Sustainable Village Development at GIPE and Sahaj Jalbodh to involve the public in aquifer mapping to improve water management.
- Significant water scarcity issues has lead to farmer suicides and rural-to-urban migration in search of livelihoods.

Shivaji's Wagh Nakh may be displayed in 5 Indian cities; will fuel research: V&A

• London's Victoria and Albert Museum which will soon return the wagh nakh (a dagger resembling tiger claws).

Key Points:

- It was used by Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj to kill Afzal Khan
- The state government has said that the wagh nakh's display in India may enable new research into their history.

- Duff took it to Britain with him and his descendants donated the weapon to the V&A Museum

- Pola is a traditional and one of the most famous festivals of Maharashtra.
- People of Maharashtra celebrate Pola at the end of monsoon season and beginning of agricultural year
- On this auspicious day, they worship cattles especially bulls who have a big contribution in farming activities.
- It is the day when farmers seek blessings for a bountiful harvest.
- This year, the festival of Pola is being celebrated on the Amavasya Tithi of Bhadrapada Month i.e., September 14, 2023.

IIT-Bombay makes AI, Data Science must for undergrad students

- The Indian Institute of Technology-Bombay (IIT-B) has decided to introduce Artificial Intelligence and Data Science (AI-DS) as a mandatory course for undergraduate students BTech as well as Bachelor of Science (BS) from this academic year.
- Earlier, Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics and Biology used to be common courses which everybody had to learn, now AI-DS is a new addition to that list in our curriculum.

Maharashtra Speaker Begins Hearing Disqualification Petitions

- The Supreme Court had stated that "the Speaker must decide on the disqualification petitions within a reasonable period".
- Maharashtra Assembly Speaker Rahul Narwekar began hearing the disqualification petitions filed against each other by the two rival Shiv Sena factions led by Chief Minister Eknath Shinde and Sena (UBT) chief and former CM Uddhav Thackeray.

Disqualification Powers of Speakers

- The Tenth Schedule or the anti-defection law, introduced in 1985, gives the Speaker of the House the power to disqualify legislators who 'defect' from the party.
- In 1992, the Supreme Court ruled that the decision of the Speaker in this regard is subject to judicial review.

'Divyanga Ke Dari' campaign by Maha Govt

- Maharashtra's Disability Welfare Department is implementing the campaign 'Divyanga Ke Dari'.
- Aim To provide the benefits of various government schemes to the disabled and also to obtain the necessary documents
- This campaign will be held on Thursday 21 September 2023 at Chayadeep Mangal Office, Aurangabad Road, Osmanabad.
- In this campaign, the disabled beneficiaries will be registered online in a category-wise manner. It is planned to take appropriate action on the applications of disabled beneficiaries received from Asha Sevika and Anganwadi Sevika as well as the applications pending earlier.

- Nawegaon-Nagzira Tiger Reserve is located in the Gondia, Maharashtra.
- Navegaon is also a home to almost 60% of the bird species found in entire Maharashtra. It was notified as the 46th Tiger Reserve of India in December 2013.

- India's top sugarcane-growing states are Maharashtra, Uttar Pradesh, Karnataka, Gujarat, and Tamil Nadu.
- The first three account for 85-90% of the sugar produced in the country.

Maharashtra - first position in attracting FDI

- Maharashtra has once again surged ahead of other states to regain its first position in terms of attracting foreign direct investments (FDIs) in the country.
- Over the last one year the state has successfully attracted around Rs 1.25 lakh foreign direct investment taking Maharashtra ahead of Karnataka and Gujarat.

 Foreign direct investment (FDI) is an investment made by a company or an individual in one country into business interests located in another country. FDI is an important driver of economic growth.

TReDS platforms

 The Reserve Bank of India has recently announced a new initiative to boost the liquidity and credit availability for MSMEs by allowing insurance companies to participate in the trade receivable discounting system (TReDS), an online platform for financing trade receivables.

Key Points:

- TReDS stands for Trade Receivables Discounting System.
- It is an electronic platform that facilitates the discounting of trade receivables of Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs) by multiple financiers.
- The TReDS platform is a centralized marketplace where buyers and sellers of trade receivables can interact with each other

Committee to study lacunae in private farm market

- The Maharashtra government has appointed a tenmember committee to study the lacunae in the present private farm markets in the state and provide recommendations to overcome it.
- The moves comes after the central government repealed three farm-laws following sustained agitation by farmers across the country in 2021
- Out of the three laws, The Farmers' Produce Trade and Commerce (Promotion and Facilitation) Act had provided for setting up a mechanism allowing the farmers to sell their farm produce outside the Agriculture Produce Market Committees (APMCs).

Indian Parliament in September 2020 passed the three farm laws:

- The Farmers' Produce Trade and Commerce (Promotion and Facilitation) Act, 2020
- The Farmers (Empowerment and Protection) Agreement on Price Assurance and Farm Services Act, 2020
- The Essential Commodities (Amendment) Act, 2020

These laws were passed with the aim of reforming the agricultural sector in India and giving farmers more freedom to sell their produce. However, the laws have been met with widespread protests from farmers, who fear that they will lead to exploitation by big corporations and lower prices for their crops.

- The Farmers' Produce Trade and Commerce (Promotion and Facilitation) Act, 2020, allows farmers to sell their produce outside of the regulated markets, known as mandis. This is intended to give farmers more freedom to choose where to sell their produce and get better prices.
- The Farmers (Empowerment and Protection) Agreement on Price Assurance and Farm Services Act, 2020, allows farmers to enter into contracts with buyers for the sale of their produce. This is intended to give farmers more certainty about the price they will receive for their crops.
- The Essential Commodities (Amendment) Act, 2020, removes some of the restrictions on the storage and movement of essential commodities, such as wheat and rice. This is intended to make it easier for traders to store and transport these commodities, which could lead to lower prices for consumers

New India Literacy Programme sets target of educating over 12 lakh illiterate people by 2024

- The New India Literacy Programme (NILP), a centrally sponsored scheme aimed at eradicating illiteracy among those above 15 years of age, is in full swing in Maharashtra.
- The course material prepared by Maharashtra State Council for Educational Research and Training (SCERT) is ready and available online in Marathi, English, Hindi among other languages on the DIKSHA portal.





Key points:

- The New India Literacy Programme (NILP) is launched by the Government of India in 2022.
- It aims to cover 5.00 crore non-literates in the age group of 15 years and above in five years, i.e., 2022-2027.
- The programme has been implemented in all the states and union territories of India.
- The NILP is a convergence programme, which means that it will be implemented in partnership with other government departments and agencies, such as the Ministry of Education, the Ministry of Rural Development, and the Ministry of Women and Child Development.

DIKSHA portal

- DIKSHA stands for Digital Infrastructure for Knowledge Sharing.
- It is a national digital platform for sharing educational resources and content.
- The platform was launched by the Ministry of Education, Government of India in 2017.
- The DIKSHA platform is available in 12 languages and can be accessed by anyone with an internet connection.

DIKSHA provides access to a variety of educational resources, including:

- 1. Textbooks and other teaching materials
- 2. Audio and video lectures
- 3. Interactive exercises
- 4. Assessment tools
- 5. Teacher training modules

Tata Steel, U.K. govt. to invest £1.25 billion in Port Talbot

- Tata Steel and the U.K. government have agreed to invest in an electric arc furnace at Port Talbot with a capital cost of £1.25 billion, including a grant of up to £500 million from the U.K.
- The project would bolster U.K.'s steel security and be the first major step towards decarbonisation of the local steel industry, reducing direct emissions by 50 million tonnes over a decade.

Key Points:

- Port Talbot is a town located in South Wales, United Kingdom, known for its rich industrial history, particularly in the steel and manufacturing sectors.
- Tata Steel is one of the largest and oldest steel manufacturing companies in India and among the top global steel producers.
- Tata Steel was founded by Jamsetji Tata in 1907, Tata Steel has a rich history of innovation, sustainability, and corporate responsibility.

Nagpur shines in vibrant Marbat festival celebrations.

- In Nagpur, Maharashtra crowds gathered enthusiastically to participate in the Marbat festival
- The focal point of this grand spectacle was the clay effigies, known as 'Marbats,' representing both Kali (in black) and Pivli (in yellow),

Key Points:

- The Marbat festival is a unique and traditional festival celebrated in Maharashtra, primarily in the city of Nagpur and its surrounding regions.
- It is a unique 150-year-old tradition celebrated exclusively in this region.
- As per the time-honored custom, devotees led a colorful procession, bearing effigies symbolizing evil forces

Access to Justice is a Fundamental Right

- Bombay HC observed that access to justice is a fundamental right and delay in filing appeals in NIA cases can be condoned.
- Bombay High Court ruled that appellate courts can condone delays and hear appeals filed beyond the mandatory 90-day period under the NIA Act.

Key points:

- The Constitution of India has provided for Constitutional articles (Article 39A, Article 14, and Article 21) that guarantee the citizens the right to access to justice.
- Right to legal aid is also now firmly entrenched in various acts including the Legal Services Authorities Act, the Supreme Court Legal Services Committee, National Legal Services Authority (NALSA) and various Lok Adalats being set up in district and remote villages in India to provide legal help to the ones who cannot afford it.

ICMR's National Institute of Virology, Pune, sent its mobile BSL-3 lab to Kozhikode for early detection of Nipah virus cases.

- Aim is to test samples for Nipah virus in the Kozhikode district after five cases, including two deaths, were reported there.
- A team of experts from the Department of Animal Husbandry has also been deployed to assist the state in the surveillance of animals

Key Points:

- The National Institute of Virology (NIV) is a premier research institution under the Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR), dedicated to the study of viruses and viral diseases.
- NIV plays a crucial role in understanding, diagnosing, and combating viral infections that have public health implications.
- NIV is involved in the development and evaluation of vaccines against viral diseases.

About Nipah Virus:

- Nipah virus (NiV) is a highly contagious and deadly zoonotic virus that can cause severe respiratory and neurological diseases in both humans and animals.
- Nipah virus was first identified in 1999 during an outbreak in Malaysia. It was named after the village of Sungai Nipah, where the initial cases occurred.
- The natural hosts of the virus are fruit bats (Pteropus spp.), also known as flying foxes.



- Human infections often occur through direct contact with infected bats, consumption of contaminated fruits or date palm sap etc
- Nipah virus is categorized as a priority pathogen by the World Health Organization (WHO) due to its epidemic potential and high mortality rate.

Iconic double-decker buses of Mumbai retire after 8 decades of service

- After 86 years of serving various routes across 'Maximum City', these non-air-conditioned double-decker buses bid adieu to daily commuters and tourists
- It was in wake of a decision by Brihanmumbai Electricity Supply and Transport (BEST) authorities to phase out the diesel-run buses as part of modernisation and operational cost-cutting measures.
- Introduced in 1937, the double-decker buses became synonymous with the city itself, etching themselves into the collective memory of its residents and tourists.

Marathwada Liberation Day

- Marathwada Liberation Day, also known as Marathwada Mukti Sangram Din, is celebrated in Maharashtra on 17 September annually.
- It marks the anniversary of Marathwada's integration with India when the Indian military, liberated State of Hyderabad, and defeated the Nizam on 17 September 1948, 13 months after Indian independence.
- Marathwada, Telangana and Kalyana-Karnataka were part of the former princely Hyderabad state

State News

67 species of reptiles, 59 amphibians recorded in Wayanad forest survey

 67 species of reptiles and 59 species of amphibians were identified in the first herpetofaunal survey that concluded recently in the South Wayanad Forest Division.

Key points

- The Survey was conducted by: University of Calicut, Kerala Forest Research Institute, South Wayanad forest department and Aranyakam Nature Foundation.
- Of these, four amphibians and three reptiles were spotted for the first time at the forest division.
- Of the 126 species identified, 48 amphibians and 21 reptiles are endemic to the Western Ghats.

Important amphibian species recorded and sighted were:

- 1. Starry Night Frog, bearing a constellation of blue dots on its obsidian body;
- 2. Miniature Night Frog, the tiniest frog in the country;
- 3. Naked Dancing Frog; and
- 4. Endangered species such as Malabar Torrent Toad and Red Stream Toad,
- 5. Wayanad Dravidogecko,
- Nilgiri Spiny Lizard, and
- 7. the Nilgiri Forest Lizard

Nipah breaks out again in Kerala

 Nipah scare returned to Kerala with two deaths from the viral infection being reported from the Kozhikode district.

Nipah Virus

- Nipah virus (NiV) infection is zoonotic disease (disease transmitted to humans from animals) that causes severe disease in both animals and humans.
- The organism which causes Nipah Virus encephalitis is RNA or Ribonucleic acid virus of family Paramyxoviridae, genus Henipavirus, and is closely related to Hendra virus.
- Fruit bats or flying foxes of Pteropodidae Family, Pteropus genus are natural host of Nipah virus.
- The virus is present in bat urine and potentially, bat faeces, saliva, and birthing fluids.
- It was first identified in 1999 during outbreak among pig farmers in Malaysia and Singapore.
- It gets its name from Sungai Nipah, a Malaysian village, where pig farmers became ill with encephalitis.

Transmission:

- The virus spread fast and is mostly fatal.
- Infected bats shed virus in their excretion and secretion.
- The virus cannot be transmitted through air.
- But it is transmitted through direct contact with infected bats, pigs.
- Human to Human transmission from other NiV-infected people is also reported

Symptoms:

• NiV infection can cause acute respiratory syndrome, breathing trouble, inflammation of the brain, fever, headache, drowsiness, disorientation and delirium.

Treatment:

 There is no vaccine for disease either for humans or animals.

No motorised boats in wetlands,NGT tells Madhya Pradesh

National Green Tribunal (NGT), prohibited operation of cruise and other motor propelled boats in Upper Lake (Bhoj Wetland now called Ramsar site) and other wetlands.

Bhoj Wetland

- The Bhoj wetland is situated in the heart of Bhopal district in Madhya Pradesh.
- The wetland consists of two man-made lakes--the upper lake and the lower lake.
- The upper lake, the oldest among large man-made lakes in central India, was created by king Bhoj in the 11th century by constructing an earthen dam across the Kolans river and the lower lake was constructed nearly 200 years ago mostly from the seepage from the upper lake..
- The lakes are very rich in biodiversity, particularly for macrophytes, phytoplankton, zooplankton, both natural and cultured fish species, both resident and migratory birds, insects, reptiles and amphibians.
- It is designated as the Ramsar site in 2002.



National Green Tribunal (NGT)

- The National Green Tribunal has been established under the National Green Tribunal Act 2010.
- New Delhi is the Principal Place of Sitting of the Tribunal and Bhopal, Pune, Kolkata and Chennai shall be the other four places of sitting of the Tribunal.
- NGT is mandated to make disposal of applications or appeals finally within 6 months of the filing of the same.
- The Tribunal comprises the Chairperson, the Judicial Members, and Expert Members.
- They shall hold office for a term of 5 years and are not eligible for reappointment.
- The Chairperson is appointed by the Central Government in consultation with the Chief Justice of India (CJI).
- A Selection Committee shall be formed by the central government to appoint the Judicial Members and Expert Members.
- There are to be at least 10 and a maximum of 20 full-time Judicial members and Expert Members in the tribunal.

We do not recognise buffer zones in Manipur, says Meitei women's group

 Leaders of the Meira Paibi, a Meitei women's collective in Manipur, do not recognise the legitimacy of buffer zones in the State, created by the Union and Manipur governments separating the Kuki-Zo population in the hills from the Meitei community in the valley.

Key points

About Meitei community

- The Meitei people, also known as the Manipuri people, are the predominant ethnic group of Manipur State.
- They speak the Meitei language (officially called Manipuri), one of the 22 official languages of India and the sole official language of Manipur State.
- The Meiteis primarily settled in the Imphal Valley region in modern-day Manipur, though a sizable population has settled in the other Indian states of Assam, Tripura, Nagaland, Meghalaya, and Mizoram.
- There is also a notable presence of Meitei in the neighbouring countries of Myanmar and Bangladesh.
- The Meitei ethnic group represents about 53% of Manipur's population.
- They are divided into clans, the members of which do not intermarry.
- Rice cultivation on irrigated fields is the basis of their economy.
- A majority follow Hinduism, while more than 8% are Muslims

Kuki Tribe

- It is one of the ethnic groups that inhabit the northeastern regions of India, Myanmar and Bangladesh.
- They are mainly found in the states of Manipur and Mizoram in India, Chin State in Myanmar, and Chittagong Hill Tracts in Bangladesh.
- They are also known as Chin or Mizo people, and they share a common ancestry and culture.

- They are part of the larger Zo people, along with the Chin and Mizo tribes.
- The Kuki tribe has a rich and diverse history, culture and tradition that reflect their adaptation to the hilly and forested terrain they live in.
- They speak various dialects of the Chin-Kuki-Mizo language family, which belong to the Tibeto-Burman branch of the Sino-Tibetan languages.

International News

Earthquake in Morocco

- A powerful earthquake of magnitude 6.8 hit the Marrakech and surrounding region in Morocco.
- This is the biggest earthquake in a North African country in 120 years.

Key points

- Most affected province and cities are Al Haouz province and Taroudant, Agadir, Al Hoceima (Mediterranean port city)
- Doctors Without Borders, or MSF offers help which is a charity that provides humanitarian medical care.
- It is a non-governmental organization (NGO) of French origin known for its projects in conflict zones and in countries affected by endemic diseases.
- Such quakes occur due to the "northward convergence of the African plate with respect to the Eurasian plate along a complex plate boundary".

Did you know?

- Morocco has a coast by the Atlantic Ocean that reaches past the Strait of Gibraltar into the Mediterranean Sea.
- It is bordered by Spain to the north (a water border through the Strait and land borders with three small Spanish-controlled exclaves, Ceuta, Melilla, and Peñón de Vélez de la Gomera), Algeria to the east, and Western Sahara to the south. Since Morocco controls most of Western Sahara, its de facto southern boundary is with Mauritania.

India-Middle East-Europe mega economic corridor

 Beijing 'welcomed' India-Middle East-Europe Economic Corridor initiative but says it 'should not become a geopolitical tool'.

India-Middle East-Europe mega economic corridor

African Union - 21st member of G-20

- Union of Comoros President and AU chairperson Azali Assoumani took the seat as a full member of the G20.
- The AU is an influential organisation comprising 55 member states that make up the countries of the African continent.

Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework (GBF)



- The campaign is a collaborative effort spearheaded by gram panchayats in coordination with the Department of Health, other government departments, and local elected bodies in the rural and urban areas.
- Its core objective is to extend comprehensive healthcare coverage to every village and town, transcending geographical barriers and ensuring that no one is left behind.

PMMSY: bridging gaps in the fisheries sector

India is now counted among the world's top three countries in fish and aquaculture production

PM Matsay Sampada Yojana (PMMSY)

- It is a flagship scheme for focused and sustainable development of the fisheries sector in the country with an estimated investment of 20,050 crore for its implementation during 2020-21 to 2024-25 as part of Aatmanirbhar Bharat package.
- Ministry: Fisheries, Animal Husbandry and Dairying

Aim:

- To bring about a blue revolution through sustainable and responsible development of the fisheries sector in India.
- To double the incomes of fishers and fish farmers, reducing post-harvest losses from 20-25% to about 10% and the generation of gainful employment opportunities in the sector.

Implementation:

- It is implemented as an umbrella scheme with two separate components namely
- Central Sector Scheme: The project cost will be borne by the Central government. The entire project/unit cost will be funded by the Government of India (GoI) (i.e., 100% GoI Funding).
- Centrally Sponsored Scheme: All the subcomponents/activities will be implemented by the States/UTs and the cost will be shared between Centre and State.
- North Eastern & Himalayan States: 90% Central share and 10% State share.
- Other States: 60% Central share and 40% State share.

Genetic Engineering Assessment Committee (GEAC)

- GEAC was formed to regulate GM crop research, testing, food safety, and organism release.
- GEAC is constituted under the **Environment Protection Act of 1986.**

- It is India's main biotech regulatory body.
- GEAC was established by the Indian Ministry of Environment and Forests department.

Jal Jeevan Mission (JJM)

- JJM is GoI's **₹3.6 lakh crore scheme** that aims to provide **piped water to every village home by 2024.**
- **Vision** To provide drinking water supply to every rural household in adequate quantity of prescribed quality on regular and long-term basis.
- It comes under Jal Shakti Ministry.
- JJM was launched in 2019.

Objectives of JJM

- To provide functional household tap connections (FHTC) to every rural household.
- To prioritize provision of FHTCs in quality affected areas, villages in drought prone and desert areas, Sansad Adarsh Gram Yojana (SAGY) villages, etc.
- To provide functional tap connection to Schools, Anganwadi centres, GP buildings, Health centres, wellness centres and community buildings
- To monitor functionality of tap connections.

Did you know?

 According to the scheme's definitions, an FHTC household is one where at least 55 litres of potable water per person a day is made available to every household.

Why is JJM in the news?

- Poor implementation of scheme.

Foundation stone laid for airfield within striking distance of LAC in Ladakh

 Defence Minister Rajnath Singh virtually lays foundation stone for Nyoma airfield in Ladakh, inaugurates Nechiphu tunnel in Arunachal.


Key points

- The Nyoma Airfield, to be developed at a cost of about Rs 200 crore, will boost the air infrastructure in Ladakh and augment IAF's capability along the northern border
- Among the projects dedicated by the defence minister include the Nechiphu tunnel in Arunachal Pradesh, two airfields in West Bengal, two helipads, 22 roads, and 63 bridges. Of these 90 projects, 36 are in Arunachal Pradesh, 26 in Ladakh, 11 in Jammu & Kashmir, five in Mizoram, three in Himachal Pradesh, two each in Sikkim, Uttarakhand and West Bengal and one each in Nagaland, Rajasthan, and Andaman and Nicobar Islands.

Key points

- Indicators in these areas have been proposed by other states and union territories
- The index, a uniform tool to assess the status of governance and the impact of various interventions taken up by state governments and union territories, took up 50 indicators before deciding on the rankings for the state in 10 sectors.

- This report is released by FAO.
- According to the 2019 report, it is difficult to achieve the 'Zero Hunger' target by 2030.

Science and Technology News

Genetic engineering gives mosquito control an upgrade

 Scientists now have access to the whole genome sequences of multiple mosquito species, allowing us to genetically manipulate them. • Gene-drive technology is one such approach, which has been used in outdoor trials in India, Brazil, and Panama

Key points

- The fundamental idea behind genetic manipulation of mosquitoes is to **systematically control their populations by interfering with their reproduction.**
- Scientists worldwide have developed various genetic modification approaches. A major one in this endeavour is gene-drive technology.

Gene-drive technology

- This technology was conceived by Austin Burt, professor at Imperial College London, in a 2003 paper published in Royal Society Proceedings.
- In 2020 a genetically modified mosquito called OX5034 was released in counties in Florida and Texas.
- Genetically modified male OX5034 mosquitoes mated with female mosquitoes but the self-limiting gene prevented female offspring from surviving. Male mosquitoes would then disappear from the environment after around a dozen generations.

Mosquito-borne diseases

 Malaria, Dengue/Dengue Hemorrhagic fever (DHF), Lymphatic Filariasis (Elephantiasis), Kala-azar/Visceral Leishmaniasis (VL), Japanese Encephalitis (JE), and Chikungunya.

What are picoflare jets?

• Researchers studying the findings of the Solar Orbiter Aircraft, a joint mission by the European Space Agency and the U.S. space agency NASA, recently announced that they had detected small jets of charged particles that were being expelled in intermittent fashion from the outer regions of the sun's outer atmosphere.

Key points

- 'Picoflare jets' could be a source of the solar wind, which have important effects on the solar system at large as well as on the earth's magnetic field.
- A solar wind is a high-speed stream of charged particles from the sun, but their exact origin remains unclear.





Indian space start-ups say funding is the topmost challenge

Funding is the biggest challenge the Indian space industry
is facing today and therefore, the government should
consider setting up soft funds and additional incentives to
turbo charge the growth of the sector, said space startups and ecosystem players.

Key points

- The sector was all set for huge growth with clarity emerging on the regulation front.
- However, funding remained an issue although venture capital firms had been showing interest to invest in the sector, observed experts at the International Conference on Space 2023
- Some eight niche areas have been identified as key drivers of the space sector, which has the potential to become a \$44-billion industry in the next 10 years, from \$8 billion
- some 95% of the components for space solutions, equipment and products are imported.

Important Days

World Suicide Prevention Day

- It is observed on September 10th.
- World Suicide Prevention Day is an initiative which began in 2003 to shed light on the critical issue, diminish societal stigma, and heighten awareness.
- The theme since 2021, 'Creating Hope Through Action,' aims to inspire hope and bolster preventive measures.

Hindi Diwas: Sept 14

- September 14 is celebrated in India as Hindi Diwas.
- The Eighth Schedule of the Constitution lists 22 languages, which includes Hindi. A quiz on these languages.
- Hindi is written in the Devanagari script.

India's suicides facts

- Housewives make up over 50% of India's female suicides.
- Highest suicide rates are in the south compared to the north states.
- According to National Crime Records Bureau (2021 Study) - The number of women who died by suicide in India reached a peak of 45,026 in 2021.
- Housewives make up over 50% of India's female suicides.
- 35% of married women in poorest households had faced some form of abuse.
- Over 30% of all suicides (men and women) were due to issues relating to family or marriage.
- When we look at suicide deaths, the highest suicide rates are in the south. There is more societal pressure in these states to have a successful life. The thing is that a state with a high level of education also brings a higher level of expectations. And when those expectations are unmet the frustration level is higher.

• In the south, where female literacy rates are comparatively high and women have greater access to mass media, there tends to be a clash between modern perspectives and traditional societal norms. In contrast, the push back against traditional expectations is less pronounced in the north, partly due to lower levels of exposure among women

Benefits of new biotech/GM crops

- 1. To achieve Goal 2 of SDG Goal, i.e. 'Zero Hunger' target by 2030.
- 2. Achieving global food and nutritional security.
- 3. To mitigate climate change and produce nutrient-dense food.
- 4. Can meet India's edible oil needs.

Did you know?

- Bt cotton was commercialized as the first GM crop in India and the only GM crop allowed for cultivation.
- India faces a major deficit in edible oils, with 60% of its demand being met by imports.
- Center for Genetic Manipulation of Crop Plants (CGMCP), University of Delhi South Campus, created a GM mustard hybrid, DMH-11.
- On October 25, 2022, the Genetic Engineering Appraisal Committee (GEAC) of the Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change Government of India approved DMH-11.

Edelweiss Alternatives mulls \$500-million climate fund

• An Edelweiss group arm is planning to raise up to \$500 million for its maiden climate fund.

Key point

 The fund will be used in areas of renewable energy, transmission infrastructure, developing electric vehicle infrastructure, green infrastructure, water treatment, transport decarbonisation and industrial decarbonisation.
