National News

Union Minister Piyush Goyal unveiled the statue of the first Finance Minister of independent India.

At a function organized by the South Indian Panchayat Association in Coimbatore, Union Textiles Minister Piyush Goyal inaugurated a statue of RK Shanmugam Chetty, who served as the first Finance Minister of independent India.

India's largest home-built nuclear power plant begins operations.

In a significant development for India's energy sector, Prime Minister Narendra Modi announced that the 700 MW nuclear power plant located at Kakrapar in Gujarat has started operating at maximum capacity. This milestone marks a significant moment in India's quest for energy self-sufficiency and underscores the country's commitment to harnessing indigenous nuclear technology.

The Government of India will celebrate the sixth **National Nutrition Month in September.**

- Ministry of Women and Child Development is celebrating 6th National Nutrition Month throughout September 2023. This year, the aim is to tackle malnutrition comprehensively through a life-cycle approach.
- The focus of Potion Month 2023 is to create wider awareness about the critical stages of human life (pregnancy, infancy, childhood and adolescence). It aims to promote awareness of nutrition across India through the theme "Suposhit Bharat, Sakshar Bharat, Sakhat Bharat" (Nutrition-Rich India, Well-educated India, Empowered India).

Cabinet approved PRIP scheme to promote research and innovation.

The Union Health Ministry has announced an ambitious plan to boost research and innovation in the pharmaceutical and medtech sector. To achieve this objective, they have launched Research and Innovation in Pharma-MedTech (PRIP) Scheme, which has been approved by the Union Cabinet. The government launched the scheme earlier this month, believing that the Indian pharmaceutical industry has the potential to increase its current 3.4 percent share of the global market to 5 percent by 2030.

The National Policy focuses on three key areas:

- 1. Strengthening the regulatory framework,
- 2. Encouraging investment in innovation, and
- 3. Enabling ecosystem for innovation and research.

Aviation Minister Jyotiraditya Scindia inaugurated **Utkela Airport in Odisha**

On August 31, 2023, Union Civil Aviation Minister Jyotiraditya Scindia, along with Minister of State for Civil Aviation General Vijay Kumar Singh (Retd), achieved a milestone by inaugurating the Utkela Airport in Odisha. The development comes as part of the ambitious UDAN (Ude Desh Ka Aam Nagar) scheme, which aims to increase regional air connectivity across India.

ASI launched "Adopt a Heritage 2.0" Indian Heritage **App and e-Permit Portal.**

- To ensure preservation and conservation of India's rich cultural heritage and its priceless cultural heritage, ASI (Archaeological Survey of India) will launch " Adopt a Heritage 2.0 " program on 4th September 2023 at Joint Auditorium, IGNCA.
- The "Adopt a Heritage 2.0" program is a revamped and dynamic initiative building on the foundation laid by its predecessor launched in 2017. The program is designed facilitate active participation of corporate stakeholders in improving facilities at heritage sites using Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) funds. .

Why in the news?

- The Centre to form a 13-member technical committee to evaluate the "carrying capacity" of 13 Himalayan States.
- To mitigate and prevent disasters in these states.

Article 370

Why in the news?

- Because of recent SC hearings and verdict.
- Many petitions also challenged the Jammu and Kashmir State Reorganization Act, by which the state was bifurcated into two Union territories with effect from October 30, 2019.

Background:

- On October 17, 1949, Article 370 was added to the Indian constitution.
- It was added as a 'temporary provision', which exempted Jammu & Kashmir, permitting it to draft its own Constitution and restricting the Indian Parliament's legislative powers in the state.
- It was introduced into the draft constitution by N Gopalaswami Ayyangar as Article 306 A.
- Under Article 370: The Constituent Assembly of Jammu & Kashmir was empowered to recommend which articles of the Indian Constitution should apply to the
- The J&K Constituent Assembly was dissolved after it drafted the state's constitution.
- Clause 3 of the article 370 gives the President of India the power to amend its provisions and scope and therefore in 2019, Article 370 was abrogated and J&K was given the status of UT with legislature.

Nyaya Sanhita bill

- The Indian Penal Code was drafted by the first Law Commission which was chaired by Thomas Babington Macaulay in 1834. The code came into force in January, 1860.
- The Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita Bill, 2023 will repeal and replace the IPC.

- The BNS Bill proposes several changes in the existing provisions including those related to defamation, offence against women and attempt to commit suicide.
- While the IPC has 511 sections, the BNS Bill contains 356 provisions.

Air pollution responsible for 1.67 million deaths in India in 2019

- 1.67 million pollution related deaths were attributed to air pollution in India in 2019.
- Majority of such deaths were triggered by PM-2.5 superfine dust particles with a size of 2.5 micron.

Major security threat reported from Idukki Dam

- The Idukki Dam is a double curvature Arch dam constructed across the Periyar River in a narrow gorge between two granite hills located in Idukki District in
- At 168.91 metres it is one of the highest arch dams in Asia.
- This dam was constructed along with two other dams at Cheruthoni and Kulamavu.
- Together, the three dams and Two saddle dams, Kulamavu Saddle Dam (Near Junction) and Kulamavu Saddle Dam (Right Bank) have created an artificial lake in the area.

Food Processing sector to create 9 million jobs by 2024.

India's household consumption will quadruple, making it the world's 5th largest consumer of food and food technology.

Aarogya Maitri Cube

- India has built the world's first portable disaster hospital, called the "Aarogya Maitri Cube".
- The hospital can be airlifted and assembled into 72 cubes that contain essential medical equipment and supplies.
- The cubes can support 200 survivors for 48 hours during natural disasters or crises.
- It has been developed indigenously under the Project BHISHM(Bharat Health Initiative for Sahyog Hita and Maitri).
- The hospital includes Operation theatres, mini-ICUs, Ventilators, Blood test equipment, an X-ray machine, a Cooking station, Food, Water, a Shelter, Power generator.

About:

The "Aarogya Maitri Cube" is part of "Aarogya Maitri" project. The project aims to provide essential medical supplies to any developing country affected by natural disasters or humanitarian crises.

PM Modi along with his counterpart, Pravind Jugnauth Discussed cooperation in sectors like infrastructure, FinTech, culture and more

CMFRI's research on India's marine biodiversity displayed at UN meet

- Research findings of the ICAR-Central Marine Fisheries Research Institute (CMFRI) on India's ecosystems were showcased at UN Meet.
- United Nations meeting was held at Seoul, South Korea to discuss the Global Biodiversity Framework.

Key points

- India emphasized its commitment to marine ecosystem conservation, particularly mangroves and coral reefs, the identification of marine protected areas, and the promotion of sustainable marine fishing.
- India emphasized about the Sustainable Ocean Initiative (SOI) workshop, which is aimed to accelerate the implementation of the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework (KMGBF) of the UN Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD).
- The report highlighted CMFRI's research in developing a deep learning-enabled image recognition model for classifying underwater coral images as part of efforts to restore ocean ecosystems.
- It also mentioned CMFRI's attempts to map the spatial distribution of aquatic invasive species in the northern Indian Ocean region.

Did you know?

SOI is a global platform that seeks to build partnerships and enhance capacity to achieve global goals and targets related to marine and coastal biodiversity.

CBI does not require permission to probe pre-2014 cases too: SC

A Constitution Bench held that a Supreme Court judgment of 2014 which declared invalid a legal provision mandating the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) to take prior permission before investigating corruption cases against senior government officials has a retrospective effect.

Key points

A five-judge Bench headed by Justice Sanjay Kishan Kaul said the provision in question, Section 6A of the Delhi Special Police Establishment (DSPE) Act, the statute that governs the CBI, was void from the very day of its insertion on September 11, 2003.

- The 106-page judgment held that Section 6A violated fundamental rights, and once a law is declared to be unconstitutional, being violative of Part-III (fundamental rights) of the Constitution, then it would be held to be void ab initio, still born, unenforceable and non est
- This means that senior government officials involved in corruption cases even before the date of the Supreme Court judgment invalidating the need for prior sanction would no longer be able to avail the protection of prior approval.

Series of disruptive weather and climate phenomenon occurring in India linked to food security

El Nino-Southern Oscillation (ENSO) cycle.

- El Nino and La Nina are complex weather patterns resulting from variations in ocean temperatures in the Equatorial Pacific Region. They are opposite phases of what is known as the El Nino-Southern Oscillation (ENSO) cycle.
- The ENSO cycle describes the fluctuations in temperature between the ocean and atmosphere in the east-central Equatorial Pacific.
- El Nino and La Nina episodes typically last nine to 12 months, but some prolonged events may last for years.

- El Nino is a climate pattern that describes the unusual warming of surface waters in the eastern tropical Pacific Ocean.
- It is the "warm phase" of a larger phenomenon called the El Nino-Southern Oscillation (ENSO).
- It occurs more frequently than La Nina.
- El Niño is a loose translation of "little boy" or "Christ child" in Spanish.
- El Niño is the warming of sea waters in Central-east Equatorial Pacific that occurs every few years (Warm phase off the coast of Peru).
- During El Niño, surface temperatures in the equatorial Pacific rise
- This weakens the trade winds east-west winds that blow near the Equator.
- Due to El Niño, easterly trade winds that blow from the Americas towards Asia change direction to turn into westerlies.
- It thus brings warm water from the western Pacific towards America



Special Session to discuss Parliament's 75-year journey, take up Bills on CEC, the Press

- There will be a discussion on "Parliamentary journey of 75 years starting from Samvidhan Sabha achievements, experiences, memories and learnings".
- The agenda indicates a plan to shift to the new Parliament building.
- Three Bills will be taken up:
 - a) the Post Office Bill, 2023 to "consolidate and amend the law relating to Post Office in India";
 - b) the Chief Election Commissioner and Other Election Commissioners (Appointment, Conditions of Service and Term of Office) Bill, to "regulate the appointment, conditions of service and term of office of the Chief Election Commissioner and Other Election Commissioners": and
 - the Repealing and Amending Bill, 2023 to "repeal c) certain enactments and to amend an enactment".
- In addition to these, the Lok Sabha will take up the Advocates (Amendment) Bill, 2023, and the Press and Registration of Periodicals Bill, 2023.

Activists raise concerns over legal loophole pertaining to sexual assault of animals

Animal rights activists across India have expressed their concern at the absence of any provision to address sexual crimes against animals in the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS), 2023 Bill that seeks to repeal the Indian Penal Code (IPC), 1860.

Key points

- While the 2018 judgment removing portions of Section 377 of the IPC decriminalised sex between consenting same-gender adults, it did not address the guestion of bestiality.
- Currently, Section 377 of the IPC provides for punishment of those found engaging in bestiality.
- It states, "Whoever voluntarily has carnal intercourse against the order of nature with any man, woman or animal, shall be punished with imprisonment for life, or with imprisonment of either description for a term which may extend to ten years, and shall also be liable to fine."

Note: The meaning of BESTIALITY is sexual relations between a human being and a lower animal.

National Centre for Disease Control (NCDC)

A Central team of officials from NCDC is expected to visit Maruthonkara and Ayancheri areas in Kozhikode district of Kerala where two persons died due to Nipah infection recently.

Key points

National Centre for Disease Control (NCDC):

- It is an institute under the Indian Directorate General of Health Services, Ministry of Health and Family Welfare.
- The Director, an officer of the Public Health sub-cadre of Central Health Service, is the administrative and technical head of the Institute.
- Headquarters: New Delhi.
- It functions as the nodal agency in the country for disease surveillance facilitating prevention and control of communicable diseases.

Constitution articles dealing with language

- Union Home Minister Amit Shah said that simple and clear Hindi words should be used in office work, adding that the principle of language change says that "language moves from complexity to simplicity".
- The Minister said that the Hindi language had played an unprecedented role in uniting the country during the difficult days of the Independence movement, instilled a feeling of unity in a country divided into many languages and dialects, and played an important role in carrying the freedom struggle from east to west and north to south in the country.

Key points

- Article 343 of the Indian Constitution talks about the Official language of the Union
- Article 344 talks about Commission and Committee of Parliament on official language

SC joins National Judicial Data Grid

- Real-time data on the filing and disposal of cases in the Supreme Court will now be available at the fingertips of the common man, just a click of a mouse away.
- Chief Justice of India D.Y. Chandrachud announced the onboarding of the Supreme Court on the National Judicial Data Grid (NJDG)

Key points

- The NJDG portal is a national repository of data relating to cases instituted, pending and disposed of by the courts across the length and breadth of the country.
- The onboarding of Supreme Court's case data on the NJDG is based on the 'open data policy'.
- Data will be uploaded on the NJDG on a real-time and daily basis.

All reported births, deaths to be digitally registered from Oct. 1

All reported births and deaths in the country will be digitally registered on the Centre's portal from October 1, 2023.



Key points

- The Registration of Births and Deaths (Amendment) Act, 2023 that paves the way for digital birth certificates will come into effect from October 1.
- The digital birth certificates will be a single document to be used for admission to educational institutions, applications for driving licence, government jobs, passports or Aadhaar, voter enrolment, and registration of marriage, and others.
- The centralised database will also update the National Population Register (NPR), ration cards, property registration, and electoral rolls.

National Population Register (NPR) and Census National Population Register (NPR):

- The National Population Register (NPR) is a register of usual residents of the country.
- It includes both Indian citizens as well as a foreign citizen.
- According to the Citizenship (Registration of Citizens and issue of National Identity Cards) Rules, 2003, a usual resident is a person who has resided in a local area for the past 6 months or more or a person who intends to reside in that area for the next 6 months or more.
- It is being prepared at the local (Village/sub-Town), sub-District, District, State and National level under provisions of the Citizenship Act 1955 and the Citizenship (Registration of Citizens and issue of National Identity Cards) Rules, 2003
- The Census is the enumeration of the population of the country and it is being conducted at an interval of 10 years

NPR vs Census

- The decennial census is the largest single source of a variety of statistical information on the different characteristics of the people of India.
- While NPR only contains demographic information, more details are required for the census like information on demography, economic activity, literacy and education, and housing and household amenities among others.

India vs Bharat controversy

- In dinner invitations sent to G-20 summit guests had carried the nomenclature of the President of India as 'President of Bharat'.
- Government critics have alleged that Modi's Govt is planning to change the name to only Bharat.

Key points:

- Article 1 says, "India, that is Bharat, shall be a Union of States".
- Parliament has the absolute power to change the name of the country at any time by amending the Constitution.
- Article 368 deals with the Constitutional Amendment.

Did you know?

- Article 52 says that there shall be a President of India. Therefore, constitutionally speaking, there is no President of Bharat in the country.
- The word 'Bharat' is not used in any of the articles of the Constitution except in the Hindi version, which was published under the authority of the President under Article 394A.
- Article 1 in the Hindi translation of the Constitution says "Bharat means India", which shows that Bharat is treated as the translation of India.

Santiniketan declared UNESCO World Heritage site

Santiniketan, the famed place in West Bengal where poet Rabindranath Tagore built Visva-Bharati over a century ago, has been inscribed on the UNESCO World Heritage List.

Key points

- Established in 1901 by poet and philosopher Tagore, Santiniketan was a residential school and centre for art based on ancient Indian traditions and a vision of the unity of humanity transcending religious and cultural boundaries.
- A 'world university' was established at Santiniketan in 1921, recognising the unity of humanity or "Visva Bharati".
- Distinct from the prevailing British colonial architectural orientations of the early 20th century and of European modernism, Santiniketan represents approaches toward a pan-Asian modernity, drawing on ancient, medieval and folk traditions from across the region.

India becomes 13th nation that can issue OIML certificates

India joins an exclusive club of 12 nations, today. India is now authorized to issue the International Organization of Legal Metrology (OIML) - an international standard-setting bodyapproval certificates.



Key points

India now can support its domestic manufacturers of weighing and measuring products like weighing devices, taxi meters, speedometers, agricultural measuring devices such as cereal moisture meters, health-related devices such as exhaust measurements and alcohol content of drinks, etc., to export to the international market.

The International Organization of Legal Metrology (OIML)

- It is an intergovernmental organisation that was created in 1955 to promote the global harmonisation of the legal metrology (science of measurement) procedures that underpin and facilitate international trade.
- It has 63 Member States and 64 Corresponding Members. India became a member in 1956.
- India is now an exclusive group of nations, including Australia, Switzerland, China, Czech Republic, Germany, Denmark, France, United Kingdom, Japan, Netherlands, Sweden, and Slovakia, as the 13th country worldwide, authorized to issue OIML approval certificates.

India's non-communicable diseases (NCD) burden will be nearly \$4 trillion by 2030.

- Infant mortality has improved by four times, maternal mortality has improved by seven times and the average life expectancy of an Indian is up nearly 30% from 55 years to over 70 now.
- Today, India has world-class health-care infrastructure along with incredible clinical talent that delivers the best in class clinical outcomes at incredible scale and at a fraction of the global price.
- India's expertise in highly specialised areas such as organ transplants, cardiology, oncology and more has made the country a fast-growing destination for medical value travel (MVT), not just for the price but also for the speed of access and the sheer quality of care.
- Al expenditure in India is expected to reach \$11.78 billion by 2025. It is expected to add \$1 trillion to India's economy by 2035.

Kuno cheetahs to be released into the wild in winter with collars on

The cheetahs in Kuno are likely to be released into the wild after the onset of winter, and they will have their collars fitted back on them

Key points

Kuno Palpur National Park:

- Kuno National Park lies in Sheopur district of Madhya Pradesh in Central India near the Vindhyan Hills.
- With an area of 748 sq. km, the park is located within the larger Kuno Wildlife Division.
- Initially established as a wildlife sanctuary, it was only in 2018 that the government changed its status into a national park.
- Named after the Kuno River (One of the main tributaries of the Chambal River) that cuts across it, Kuno is primarily a grassland region.
- Flora and Fauna: The protected area of the forest is home to the jungle cat, Indian leopard, sloth bear, Indian wolf, striped hyena, golden jackal, Bengal fox and dhole, along with more than 120 bird species
- Kuno National Park was selected under 'Action Plan for Introduction of Cheetah in India'.

Ni-kshay 2.0 portal

- The Ni-kshay 2.0 portal provides a digital platform for extending community support to persons with TB and leveraging Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) opportunities.
- 'Differentiated TB Care' as a part of the initiative is aimed at assessing and triaging patients to decide whether people with TB need ambulatory care or admission in a health facility.

Women's quota Bill in Lok Sabha

Central government passed the women's reservation Bill in the Lok Sabha to reserve one-third of the seats in the Lower House and In the legislative Assemblies for women.

Key points

- It is tabled as the Constitution (One Hundred and Twenty Eighth) Amendment Bill, 2023.
- It would be implemented only after the 2026 delimitation exercise using data from the Census to be conducted.
- The reservation in the Lok Sabha can hence be implemented only in the Lok Sabha election in 2029 and not in 2024.
- The women participation will then go to 181 from the current participation of 82 members.

Did you know?

It was first introduced in the parliament in 1996 by Deve Gowda government



Important facts about Delimitation Commission

The 128th Constitutional Amendment Bill, 2023 will be implemented after the 2026 delimitation.

Key points

- Delimitation deals with adjusting the boundaries of constituencies according to the population.
- Article 82 and Article 170 of the Constitution empowers the Parliament to readjust the allocation of seats in the Lok Sabha and the Legislative Assemblies of States respectively, after every census.

About Delimitation Commission

- It is a high-powered committee entrusted with the task of drawing and redrawing boundaries of different constituencies for state assembly and Lok Sabha election.
- It is appointed by the President and works in collaboration with the Election Commission.
- The Commission consists of A retired or working Supreme Court Judge (chairperson), Election Commissioner and Concerned State Election Commissioners

Did you know?

The Commission's orders cannot be called in question before any court.

Census and Delimitation

Government has decided to implement the women's reservation bill only after census and delimitation work is done which are going to be conducted after LS 2024 polls.

About Census:

- Census is the process of collecting, compiling, analyzing and disseminating demographic, social, cultural and economic data relating to all persons in the country, at a particular time.
- It provides basic statistics on the state of human resources, demography, culture and economic structure
- The first synchronous census was taken under British rule in 1881, by W.C. Plowden, Census Commissioner of India.
- The responsibility of conducting the decadal census rests with the Office of the Registrar General and Census Commissioner of India, Ministry of Home Affairs

Delimitation

- Delimitation is the process of redrawing the boundaries of territorial constituencies in a nation.
- It reflects the changes in population.

- The Constitution requires that the Commission's decisions be final and cannot be challenged in court
- The Lok Sabha or State Legislative Assembly cannot modify the Delimitation Commission's orders once they have been laid before them.

About delimitation commission

- Delimitation literally means the act or process of fixing limits or boundaries of territorial constituencies in a country
- In India, such Delimitation Commissions have been constituted 4 times under delimitation commission act
- The first delimitation commission was constituted in 1952 under delimitation commission act of 1952
- Article 82 and Article 170 of the Constitution the Parliament must pass delimitation commission act for LS and state legislature

Did you know?

- It is appointed by the President
- The Ex- officio member of Commission
 - 1. a SC court judge,
 - 2. chief election commissioner of India
 - 3. election commissioner of concerned state

Number of mineral exploration projects approved by **NMET**


The National Mineral Exploration Trust (NMET) has approved 309 projects worth ₹2,100 crore.

Key points

 Of the projects approved, 151 have been completed, while the rest are in progress

About District Mineral Foundation(DMF)

- As per the Mine and Minerals Development Regulation (Amendment) Act, 2015, the state government shall constitute DMF
- It should be constituted in every affected district





- It was established as a non-profit body to be called the District Mineral Foundation.
- DMF Funds-it constitutes one third of royalty from every license holder to DMF as per rates prescribed by the Central Government.
- This fund will be used for welfare of the people affected in the mining affected areas

Constitution Bench has decided to check the validity of 104th AA

Constitution Bench decided to examine whether Parliament can use its constituent power to repeatedly amend Article 334

Key points

- Article 334 of the constitution is related to the reservation of seats for SC/ST in the Lok Sabha and State Legislative Assemblies to cease after a certain period.
- It was originally provided for ten years but the article has been amended several times to continue the reservation.

Did you know?

Article 15(4) and Article 16(4) of the Indian Constitution allows the federal government and state governments to reserve seats in government services for members of the SC and ST communities.

National Population Register (NPR) & Census **National Population Register (NPR)**

- The National Population Register (NPR) is a register of usual residents of the country.
- It includes both Indian citizens as well as a foreign citizen.
- The categorisation of residents done According to the Citizenship (Registration of Citizens and issue of National Identity Cards) Rules, 2003'.
- A usual resident is a person who has resided in a local area for the past 6 months or more or a person who intends to reside in that area for the next 6 months or more.

Census

- Population Census provides basic statistics of state on various elements
- It includes the data on human resources, demography, culture and economic structure at all levels.
- The responsibility of conducting the decadal census rests with the Office of the Registrar General and Census Commissioner of India.
- It comes under the Ministry of Home Affairs.

Did you know?

The government has passed the bill in Lok sabha as well Rajya sabha.

- The amendment bill seeks to amend the Registration of Births and Deaths Act, 1969 which provides for registration and regulation of birth and death.
- The Bill adds that the Registrar General will maintain a national database of registered births and deaths.
- The Bill amends the provision of obtaining extract to provide for obtaining a birth or death certificate (electronically or otherwise) instead of extracts.
- The Bill adds that, in cases of births, the specified persons shall provide the Aadhaar number of the parents and the informant
- District registrar is the appealing authority
- It introduces a significant shift towards digital birth certificates.

Did you know?

The registration of births and deaths falls under the Concurrent List, giving powers to both Parliament and state legislatures to make laws on the subject

Rules will be framed for ASI monuments

The Parliamentary Standing Committee on Transport Tourism and Culture has asked the government to revise the rules to make them realistic

Key facts:

- The existing rules declare the 100m area as prohibited and 300 m is regulated.
- The provisions apply to all significant and nonsignificant monuments.
- The rules are hindering the construction and renovation process of locals living around the marked area.

Did you know?

The prohibited and restricted area provision was introduced in 2010 through an amendment to the Ancient Monuments and Archaeological Sites and Remains (AMASR) Act, 1958.

Global rating agency Moody's flags concerns about India's Aadhaar

Global rating agency Moody's Investors Service has flagged concerns about security and privacy vulnerabilities in centralised identification systems such as India's Aadhaar programme.



Key points

- According to them the unique ID system often results in "service denials" in humid conditions and the biometric is also unreliable at that time.
- It also faces the burden of establishing authorisation.
- This can lead to Aadhaar-based payments problems for labourers.

Aadhaar

- Aadhaar is a 12-digit unique identification number issued by the Unique Identification Authority of India (UIDAI).
- It serves as proof of identity, which is linked to the individual's biometric and demographic information.
- It is now mandatory for a number of government services

It is the world's largest digital program that is helping in covering the leakages in transfer of subsidy.

House panel asks govt. to monitor activities of ESIC

Parliamentary Standing Committee (PSC) on Labour, has asked the Union government to strictly monitor the activities of the Employees State Insurance Corporation (ESIC), so that social security benefits reach more workers.

ESIC:

- It is set up under the Employee State Insurance Act of 1948.
- It is responsible for overseeing the ESI plan.
- It works under the Ministry of Labour & Employment
- Its aim is to provide socio-economic protection to the worker population and immediate dependent or family covered under the ESI scheme.

About NAAC:

- The NATIONAL ASSESSMENT AND ACCREDITATION COUNCIL (NAAC) conducts assessment accreditation of Higher Educational Institutions (HEI) such as colleges, universities or other recognised institutions to derive an understanding of the 'Quality Status' of the institution.
- NAAC evaluates the institutions for its conformance to the standards of quality in terms of its performance related to the educational processes and outcomes, curriculum coverage, teaching-learning processes, faculty, research, infrastructure, learning resources, organisation, governance, financial well being and student services.

Vultures breeding: 50 captive vultures will be released in the wild soon

Over the next one year, 50 captive vultures will be released in the wild in Maharashtra, Rajasthan and Madhya Pradesh.



These vultures are part of the 650 that have been bred over the last 20 years at four Conservation Breeding Centres by the Bombay Natural History Society (BNHS) with funding by the Royal Society for Protection of Birds, UK, and later by the state forest department where the centers are located.

Did you know?

- The chief cause for the decline in vulture population was the use of diclofenac injections in cattle.
- The Panna tiger reserve has a large number of wild vultures.

BNHS members explore Amboli's Biodiversity and **Bioluminescent Fungus**

Bombay Natural History Society (BNHS) recently discovered hundreds of species of native plants in a small forest patch in Devrai (Sacred Groves) near Amboli.

Key points:

- BNHS members spotted endemic herpetofauna, including the Malabar Pit Viper, Amboli Bush Frog, Malabar Gliding Frog, and the Critically Endangered Amboli Tiger Toad.
- They witnessed bioluminescent fungus during one of the night trails.

Bombay Natural History Society (BNHS)

- It is a Non-Governmental Organisation in India engaged in conservation and biodiversity research.
- It was founded on 15 September 1883.
- BNHS is the partner of BirdLife International in India. It has been designated as a 'Scientific and Industrial Research Organisation' by the Department of Science and Technology.
- Logo: The BNHS logo is the great hornbill.
- Internet of Birds platform: IT consultancy firm Accenture and the Bombay Natural History Society have developed Internet of Birds platform that identifies bird species found in India using Artificial Intelligence technology, including machine learning and computer vision, from digital photos that are uploaded by the public.

Constitutional Provisions Governing Reservation in

- States do not have authority to grant reservation, says Maharashtra education minister.
- Maharashtra education minister Deepak Kesarkar said the issue of reservation was related to the Constitution and the states did not have much authority to grant quotas.

Let us understand the Constitutional Provisions governing Reservation in India:

- Part XVI deals with reservation of SC and ST in Central and State legislatures.
- Article 15(4) and 16(4) of the Constitution enabled the State and Central Governments to reserve seats in government services for the members of the SC and ST.
- The Constitution was amended by the Constitution (77th Amendment) Act, 1995 and a new clause (4A) was inserted in Article 16 to enable the government to provide reservation in promotion.
- Later, clause (4A) was modified by the Constitution (85th Amendment) Act, 2001 to provide consequential seniority to SC and ST candidates promoted by giving reservation.
- Constitutional 81st Amendment Act, 2000 inserted Article 16 (4 B) which enables the state to fill the unfilled vacancies of a year which are reserved for SCs/STs in the succeeding year, thereby nullifying the ceiling of fifty percent reservation on total number of vacancies of that year.
- Article 330 and 332 provides for specific representation through reservation of seats for SCs and STs in the Parliament and in the State Legislative Assemblies respectively
- Article 243D provides reservation of seats for SCs and STs in every Panchayat.
- Article 233T provides reservation of seats for SCs and STs in every Municipality.
- Article 335 of the constitution says that the claims of STs and STs shall be taken into consideration constituently with the maintenance of efficacy of the administration.

No takers for 19k RTE seats in state's private schools.

- Every year, there is a clamor for seats under the Right to Education (RTE) Act with lakhs applying for free admission in private schools.
- This year, nearly 19,000 seats under the 25% scheme are vacant in Maharashtra even though 3.64 lakh applications were received by the state education department for the 1.01 lakh seats.
- Education officials said that the vacant seats were in non-popular schools and with government schools also providing quality education, many preferred to study there.

Did you know?

- The Right of Children to Free and Compulsory Education Act, 2009 (RTE Act) is an Act of the Parliament of India enacted on 4 August 2009.

Private hospital to combat drug resistant tuberculosis (DRTB)

- The Nagpur Municipal Corporation's (NMC's) pilot project involving a private hospital to combat growing cases of patients suffering from drug resistant tuberculosis (DRTB) is showing encouraging results with 18 persons being cured of the deadly disease within four months of its launch.
- The NMC had roped in Astha Critical Care Centre at Suyog Nagar to provide free services to DRTB patients who were shunned by even other overburdened and stressed public hospitals.

National Tuberculosis Elimination Program (NTEP):

- The NTEP is a government-led program that aims to eliminate tuberculosis (TB) in India by 2025.
- The program was launched in 1997 and has made significant progress in reducing the TB burden in India.
- In 2018, India accounted for 27% of the global TB burden, but only 10% of the global TB deaths.
- The NTEP is implemented by the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MoHFW) and works with state and district governments, as well as non-governmental organizations (NGOs).

Shyam Hotel to be converted into a monument for Dr. **Ambedkar**

The Nagpur Metropolitan Region Development Authority (NMRDA) has now decided to take up the ambitious work of renovation of Shyam Hotel at Sitabuldi and convert it into a monument for Dr. Ambedkar.

Key Points:

- TReDS stands for Trade Receivables Discounting System.
- It is an electronic platform that facilitates the discounting of trade receivables of Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs) by multiple financiers.
- The TReDS platform is a centralized marketplace where buyers and sellers of trade receivables can interact with each other

Committee to study lacunae in private farm market

- The Maharashtra government has appointed a tenmember committee to study the lacunae in the present private farm markets in the state and provide recommendations to overcome it.
- The moves comes after the central government repealed three farm-laws following sustained agitation by farmers across the country in 2021
- Out of the three laws, The Farmers' Produce Trade and Commerce (Promotion and Facilitation) Act had provided for setting up a mechanism allowing the farmers to sell their farm produce outside the Agriculture Produce Market Committees (APMCs).



Indian Parliament in September 2020 passed the three farm laws:

- The Farmers' Produce Trade and Commerce (Promotion and Facilitation) Act, 2020
- The Farmers (Empowerment and Protection) Agreement on Price Assurance and Farm Services Act, 2020
- The Essential Commodities (Amendment) Act, 2020 These laws were passed with the aim of reforming the agricultural sector in India and giving farmers more freedom to sell their produce. However, the laws have been met with widespread protests from farmers, who fear that they will lead to exploitation by big corporations and lower prices for their crops.
- The Farmers' Produce Trade and Commerce (Promotion and Facilitation) Act, 2020, allows farmers to sell their produce outside of the regulated markets, known as mandis. This is intended to give farmers more freedom to choose where to sell their produce and get better prices.
- The Farmers (Empowerment and Protection) Agreement on Price Assurance and Farm Services Act, 2020, allows farmers to enter into contracts with buyers for the sale of their produce. This is intended to give farmers more certainty about the price they will receive for their crops.
- The Essential Commodities (Amendment) Act, 2020, removes some of the restrictions on the storage and movement of essential commodities, such as wheat and rice. This is intended to make it easier for traders to store and transport these commodities, which could lead to lower prices for consumers

New India Literacy Programme sets target of educating over 12 lakh illiterate people by 2024

- The New India Literacy Programme (NILP), a centrally sponsored scheme aimed at eradicating illiteracy among those above 15 years of age, is in full swing in Maharashtra.
- The course material prepared by Maharashtra State Council for Educational Research and Training (SCERT) is ready and available online in Marathi, English, Hindi among other languages on the DIKSHA portal.

Key points:

- The New India Literacy Programme (NILP) is launched by the Government of India in 2022.
- It aims to cover 5.00 crore non-literates in the age group of 15 years and above in five years, i.e., 2022-2027.

- The programme has been implemented in all the states and union territories of India.

- 4. Assessment tools
- 5. Teacher training modules

Tata Steel, U.K. govt. to invest £1.25 billion in Port **Talbot**

- Tata Steel and the U.K. government have agreed to invest in an electric arc furnace at Port Talbot with a capital cost of £1.25 billion, including a grant of up to £500 million from the U.K.
- The project would bolster U.K.'s steel security and be the first major step towards decarbonisation of the local steel industry, reducing direct emissions by 50 million tonnes over a decade.

Access to Justice is a Fundamental Right

- Bombay HC observed that access to justice is a fundamental right and delay in filing appeals in NIA cases can be condoned.
- Bombay High Court ruled that appellate courts can condone delays and hear appeals filed beyond the mandatory 90-day period under the NIA Act.

Key points:

- The Constitution of India has provided Constitutional articles (Article 39A, Article 14, and Article 21) that guarantee the citizens the right to access to justice.
- Right to legal aid is also now firmly entrenched in various acts including the Legal Services Authorities Act, the Supreme Court Legal Services Committee, National Legal Services Authority (NALSA) and various Lok Adalats being set up in district and remote villages in India to provide legal help to the ones who cannot afford it.

ICMR's National Institute of Virology, Pune, sent its mobile BSL-3 lab to Kozhikode for early detection of Nipah virus cases.

About Nipah Virus:

- Nipah virus (NiV) is a highly contagious and deadly zoonotic virus that can cause severe respiratory and neurological diseases in both humans and animals.
- Nipah virus was first identified in 1999 during an outbreak in Malaysia. It was named after the village of Sungai Nipah, where the initial cases occurred.
- The natural hosts of the virus are fruit bats (Pteropus spp.), also known as flying foxes.
- Human infections often occur through direct contact with infected bats, consumption of contaminated fruits or date palm sap etc
- Nipah virus is categorized as a priority pathogen by the World Health Organization (WHO) due to its epidemic potential and high mortality rate.

Iconic double-decker buses of Mumbai retire after 8 decades of service

- After 86 years of serving various routes across 'Maximum City', these non-air-conditioned doubledecker buses bid adieu to daily commuters and tourists
- It was in wake of a decision by Brihanmumbai Electricity Supply and Transport (BEST) authorities to phase out the diesel-run buses as part of modernisation and operational cost-cutting measures.
- Introduced in 1937, the double-decker buses became synonymous with the city itself, etching themselves into the collective memory of its residents and tourists.

Marathwada Liberation Day

Key points:

- 'Common Crane' is a bird protected under Schedule I of the Wildlife Protection Act, 1972.
- The common crane (Grus grus) is a large, long-legged wading bird in the family Gruidae.
- It is the only crane commonly found in Europe besides the demoiselle crane (Grus virgo) and the Siberian crane (Leucogeranus leucogeranus) that only are regular in the far eastern part of the continent.





- IUCN Red List Status: Least Concern.
- Common Cranes are medium-sized cranes that weigh between 3-6kg.

Drought Like Conditions in Maharashtra

- Drought-like condition in thirteen districts; Severe shortages in Nagar, Sangli, Satara, Jalna, Beed.
- Out of 36 districts of the state, drought-like conditions have arisen in 13 districts.
- According to the India Meteorological Department, the state received nine percent less rainfall than the average from June 1 to September 18


Major reason for this - El-Nino phenomenon.

About El-Nino:

- El Niño is the warming of seawater in the central-east Equatorial Pacific that occurs every few years.
- During El Niño, surface temperatures in the equatorial Pacific rise, and trade winds — east-west winds that blow near the Equator — weaken.
- Normally, easterly trade winds blow from the Americas towards Asia.
- Due to El Niño, they falter and change direction to turn into westerlies, bringing warm water from the western Pacific towards the Americas.
- It occurs every 3-6 years and lasts for about 9-12 months.
- It can cause droughts, flooding, and changes in temperature.
- It can lead to below-normal rainfall, which affects India's agricultural sector.

India Meteorological Department

- The India Meteorological Department (IMD) is the national meteorological service of India.
- It is under the administrative control of the Ministry of Earth Sciences.
- The IMD is headquartered in New Delhi



The IMD provides a wide range of meteorological services, including:

- 1. Weather forecasting for the general public, aviation, maritime, and other sectors
- 2. Climate monitoring and research
- 3. Monsoon forecasting
- 4. Severe weather warnings and advisories
- 5. Agrometeorological services
- 6. Environmental monitoring

Maratha quota panel

MH state government has formed a 20-member team to assist the panel headed by retired Justice Sandeep Shinde to meet the demand of recognising Maratha community as Kunbi and grant them OBC certificates

Key Points:

Key Points:.

- Chitri is a village of barely 70 houses and population of 462 in Dharani taluk of Melghat.
- Majority of the population of Bhilala, Korku, Gond, Gawli communities are in this village. Agriculture, labor and livestock management are the major sources of income.
- The entire bamboo center trained 60 people from 23 households in this village to make various items from bamboo.

Fungus destroyed 30% of soybeans in MH

- Due to Sudden increase in the temperature, soybeans were attacked by fungi.
- Crops have turned yellow, and have started to dry up.
- Around 30 percent of soybeans are lost due to fungus.

Key Points:

- Experts are saying that this fungal disease is being seen for the first time in hundred years.
- Fungus infestation has increased in Wardha district.
- Soybeans are currently being affected by mealybug, whitefly, camel worm, leafhopper, tobacco leaf-eating worm, cutworm, yellow mosaic disease.

Alleviate Water Scarcity in Marathwada

The Shinde-Fadnavis government recently approved some water resources projects to solve the water shortage in Marathwada.

Key Points:

- Efforts are being made to bring water from North Konkan to Marathwada.
- Accordingly, diversion of a total of 22.9 TMC of water from North Konkan river basins to Godavari basin through flow diversion scheme and Upsa river **connection/diversion schemes** will be undertaken on priority.

A total fund of Rs 14,040 crore will be allotted for this.

Flow Diversion Scheme

- A flow diversion scheme is a water management project that diverts water from one river basin to another.
- This can be done for a variety of reasons, such as to provide irrigation water to arid regions, to generate hydropower, or to improve water quality.
- Flow diversion schemes can be complex and expensive to build, and they can also have a significant impact on the environment.
- For example, diverting water from one river basin can reduce the flow of water in that basin, which can harm downstream ecosystems.

Upsa river connection/diversion schemes

- The Upsa river is a tributary of the Krishna river. It flows through the Telangana state in India.
- The Upsa river connection/diversion schemes are a series of proposed projects that would divert water from the Upsa river to the Krishna river basin.
- The goal of the Upsa river connection/diversion schemes is to provide additional water to the Krishna river basin, which is facing a water shortage.
- The schemes would also generate hydropower and improve water quality in the Krishna river basin.

The BEST initiative has decided to preserve the last non-AC double decker bus in the BEST fleet.

- Brihanmumbai Electric Supply and **Transport** Undertaking(BEST) is a public transport company that operates buses in Mumbai, India.

- TrailGuard AI is a camera-based wildlife monitoring system that uses artificial intelligence (AI) to detect and identify animals.
- It is designed to help rangers and conservationists to protect wildlife from poaching and other threats.

APMCs

- Agricultural Produce Market Committees (APMCs) are statutory bodies established by state governments in India to regulate the marketing of agricultural produce.
- They were established under the Agricultural Produce Marketing Committee Act, 1964.



- APMCs play an important role in protecting the interests of farmers by ensuring that they get a fair price for their produce.
- They also help to regulate the supply of agricultural produce to the market and to prevent exploitation of farmers by middlemen.

Scrub typhus cases reported in MH

16 cases of Scrub typhus cases reported from Maharashtra after other states

Key Points:

- Cases are reported in three districts: Aurangabad, Jalna, and Buldhana.
- With several states in India grappling with an outbreak of this disease,
- The Maharashtra public health department has alerted all districts to increase surveillance.

Scrub typhus

- Scrub typhus is a mite-borne rickettsial disease that is caused by the bacteria Orientia tsutsugamushi.
- It is found in tropical and subtropical regions of Asia, Africa, and South America.
- Scrub typhus is transmitted to humans through the bite of infected chiggers (larval mites).
- Chiggers attach to the skin and feed on blood, injecting the bacteria into the bloodstream.
- The bacteria then multiply in the lymph nodes and spread to other parts of the body

Symptoms:

The symptoms of scrub typhus typically develop 5-14 days after being bitten by an infected chigger.

Symptoms include:

- Fever
- Headache
- Muscle Aches
- Rashes

PM Atma Nirbhar Swasth Bharat Yojana

- 'Prime Minister Atmanirbhar Swasth Bharat Yojana' (PMASBY) scheme was announced on 1st February, 2021, with an outlay of about Rs.64,180 Cr over six years (till FY 25-26).
- This will be in addition to the National Health Mission.

The main interventions under the scheme to be achieved by FY 25-26 are:

- Support for 17,788 rural Health and Wellness Centres in in 10 High Focus States
- Establishing 11,024 urban Health and Wellness Centres in all the States.

- Setting up of Integrated Public Health Labs in all districts and 3382 Block Public Health Units in11 High Focus states:
- Establishing Critical Care Hospital Blocks in 602 districts and 12 Central Institutions;
- Strengthening of the National Centre for Disease Control (NCDC), its 5 regional branches and 20 metropolitan health surveillance units;
- Expansion of the Integrated Health Information Portal to all States/UTs to connect all public health labs;
- Operationalisation of 17 new Public Health Units and strengthening of 33 existing Public Health Units at Points of Entry, that is at 32 Airports, 11 Seaports and 7 land-crossings;
- Setting up of 15 Health Emergency Operation Centres and 2 mobile hospitals; and
- Setting up of a national institution for One Health, a Regional Research Platform for WHO South East Asia Region, 9 Bio-Safety Level III laboratories and 4 regional National Institutes for Virology.

In Maharashtra, this year, till the end of September, as many as 30 tigers have died due to various reasons.

- The tiger is listed as Endangered on the IUCN Red List.
- The tiger occupancy has increased from 1758 cells of 100 km2 in 2018 to 1792 cells of 100 km2 in 2022.

About Chirner Jungle Satyagraha

Mizoram Assembly opposes to Forest (Conservation) **Amendment Act, 2023**

It aims to bring significant changes to the Forest (Conservation) Act, 1980, which is a crucial central statute for the conservation of forests in India.

Mukhyamantri Kamdhenu Bima Yojana

- It is a new scheme by the Rajasthan Government.
- Families who have milch animals (i.e. milk animals) will be given free insurance of ₹40000.
- The main objective of this scheme is that animals do not die from most diseases.
- Maximum 2 milch animals in a family will be given insurance cover under this scheme.

Parivar Pehchaan Patra (PPP)

- PPP is a scheme by Haryana Government.
- The primary objective of Parivar Pehchan Patra (PPP) is to create authentic, verified and reliable data of all families in Haryana.
- PPP scheme was formally launched in July 2019 to achieve Haryana government's vision for 'paperless' and 'faceless' delivery of schemes, services and benefits offered by the state government.
- Under this, each family is considered a single unit and gets an 8-digit unique identification number, called family ID.
- Family IDs are also linked to independent schemes like scholarships, subsidies and pensions, so as to ensure consistency and reliability.
- It also enables automatic selection of beneficiaries of various schemes, subsidies and pensions.

What are eco-sensitive zones (ESZ)?

- An area around a protected area like a national park or wildlife sanctuary
- To conserve the biodiversity and ecosystems of protected areas by regulating human activities
- The government can regulate and restrict certain activities in ESZs through guidelines and laws

Bandipur Tiger Reserve

It was established in the 1930s as a wildlife sanctuary, which became a tiger reserve in 1973 under Project tiger.

- It is situated in Karnataka and located at the tri-junction area of the States of Karnataka, Tamil Nadu and Kerala.
- This area has the River Kabini in its north and River Moyar in its south.
- It comprises diverse vegetation of dry deciduous to tropical mixed deciduous. It includes rosewood, Indian kino tree, sandalwood, Indian laurel, clumping bamboo and giant clumping bamboo etc.
- It is a shelter for the largest population of wild Asian elephants in South Asia. It comprises other mammals such as Bengal tiger, gaur, sloth bear, golden jackal, dhole and four-horned antelope etc.

Kuki Tribe

- It is one of the ethnic groups that inhabit the northeastern regions of India, Myanmar Bangladesh.
- They are mainly found in the states of Manipur and Mizoram in India, Chin State in Myanmar, and Chittagong Hill Tracts in Bangladesh.
- They are also known as Chin or Mizo people, and they share a common ancestry and culture.
- They are part of the larger Zo people, along with the Chin and Mizo tribes.
- The Kuki tribe has a rich and diverse history, culture and tradition that reflect their adaptation to the hilly and forested terrain they live in.
- They speak various dialects of the Chin-Kuki-Mizo language family, which belong to the Tibeto-Burman branch of the Sino-Tibetan languages.

Meitei Tribe

- The Meitei people, also known as the Manipuri people, are the predominant ethnic group of Manipur State.
- They speak the Meitei language (officially called Manipuri), one of the 22 official languages of India and the sole official language of Manipur State.
- The Meiteis primarily settled in the Imphal Valley region in modern-day Manipur, though a sizable population has settled in the other Indian states of Assam, Tripura, Nagaland, Meghalaya, and Mizoram.
- There is also a notable presence of Meitei in the neighbouring countries of Myanmar and Bangladesh.
- It represents about 53% of Manipur's population

67 species of reptiles, 59 amphibians recorded in **Wayanad forest survey**

67 species of reptiles and 59 species of amphibians were identified in the first herpetofaunal survey that concluded recently in the South Wayanad Forest Division.



Key points

- The Survey was conducted by: University of Calicut, Kerala Forest Research Institute, South Wayanad forest department and Aranyakam Nature Foundation.
- Of these, four amphibians and three reptiles were spotted for the first time at the forest division.
- Of the 126 species identified, 48 amphibians and 21 reptiles are endemic to the Western Ghats.

Important amphibian species recorded and sighted were:

- 1. Starry Night Frog, bearing a constellation of blue dots on its obsidian body;
- 2. Miniature Night Frog, the tiniest frog in the country;
- Naked Dancing Frog; and
- 4. Endangered species such as Malabar Torrent Toad and Red Stream Toad,
- 5. Wayanad Dravidogecko,
- 6. Nilgiri Spiny Lizard, and
- 7. the Nilgiri Forest Lizard

Nipah breaks out again in Kerala

Nipah scare returned to Kerala with two deaths from the viral infection being reported from the Kozhikode district.

Nipah Virus

- Nipah virus (NiV) infection is zoonotic disease (disease transmitted to humans from animals) that causes severe disease in both animals and humans.
- The organism which causes Nipah Virus encephalitis is acid RNA Ribonucleic virus of family Paramyxoviridae, genus Henipavirus, and is closely related to Hendra virus.
- Fruit bats or flying foxes of Pteropodidae Family, Pteropus genus are natural host of Nipah virus.
- The virus is present in bat urine and potentially, bat faeces, saliva, and birthing fluids.
- It was first identified in 1999 during outbreak among pig farmers in Malaysia and Singapore.
- It gets its name from Sungai Nipah, a Malaysian village, where pig farmers became ill with encephalitis.

Transmission:

The virus spread fast and is mostly fatal.

- Infected bats shed virus in their excretion and secretion.
- The virus cannot be transmitted through air.
- But it is transmitted through direct contact with infected bats, pigs.
- Human to Human transmission from other NiV-infected people is also reported

Symptoms:

NiV infection can cause acute respiratory syndrome, breathing trouble, inflammation of the brain, fever, headache, drowsiness, disorientation and delirium.

Treatment:

There is no vaccine for disease either for humans or animals.

No motorised boats in wetlands, NGT tells Madhya **Pradesh**

National Green Tribunal (NGT), prohibited operation of cruise and other motor propelled boats in Upper Lake (Bhoj Wetland now called Ramsar site) and other wetlands.

Bhoj Wetland

- The Bhoj wetland is situated in the heart of Bhopal district in Madhya Pradesh.
- The wetland consists of two man-made lakes--the upper lake and the lower lake.
- The upper lake, the oldest among large man-made lakes in central India, was created by king Bhoj in the 11th century by constructing an earthen dam across the Kolans river and the lower lake was constructed nearly 200 years ago mostly from the seepage from the upper lake..
- The lakes are very rich in biodiversity, particularly for macrophytes, phytoplankton, zooplankton, both natural and cultured fish species, both resident and migratory birds, insects, reptiles and amphibians.
- It is designated as the Ramsar site in 2002.

National Green Tribunal (NGT)

- The National Green Tribunal has been established under the National Green Tribunal Act 2010.
- New Delhi is the Principal Place of Sitting of the Tribunal and Bhopal, Pune, Kolkata and Chennai shall be the other four places of sitting of the Tribunal.
- NGT is mandated to make disposal of applications or appeals finally within 6 months of the filing of the same.
- The Tribunal comprises the Chairperson, the Judicial Members, and Expert Members.
- They shall hold office for a term of 5 years and are not eligible for reappointment.
- The Chairperson is appointed by the Central Government in consultation with the Chief Justice of India (CJI).
- A Selection Committee shall be formed by the central government to appoint the Judicial Members and Expert Members.
- There are to be at least 10 and a maximum of 20 fulltime Judicial members and Expert Members in the tribunal.



We do not recognise buffer zones in Manipur, says Meitei women's group

Leaders of the Meira Paibi, a Meitei women's collective in Manipur, do not recognise the legitimacy of buffer zones in the State, created by the Union and Manipur governments separating the Kuki-Zo population in the hills from the Meitei community in the valley.

Key points

About Meitei community

- The Meitei people, also known as the Manipuri people, are the predominant ethnic group of Manipur State.
- They speak the Meitei language (officially called Manipuri), one of the 22 official languages of India and the sole official language of Manipur State.
- The Meiteis primarily settled in the Imphal Valley region in modern-day Manipur, though a sizable population has settled in the other Indian states of Assam, Tripura, Nagaland, Meghalaya, and Mizoram.
- There is also a notable presence of Meitei in the neighbouring countries of Myanmar and Bangladesh.
- The Meitei ethnic group represents about 53% of Manipur's population.
- They are divided into clans, the members of which do not intermarry.
- Rice cultivation on irrigated fields is the basis of their
- A majority follow Hinduism, while more than 8% are Muslims

Kuki Tribe

- It is one of the ethnic groups that inhabit the northeastern regions of India, Myanmar and Bangladesh.
- They are mainly found in the states of Manipur and Mizoram in India, Chin State in Myanmar, and Chittagong Hill Tracts in Bangladesh.
- They are also known as Chin or Mizo people, and they share a common ancestry and culture.
- They are part of the larger Zo people, along with the Chin and Mizo tribes.
- The Kuki tribe has a rich and diverse history, culture and tradition that reflect their adaptation to the hilly and forested terrain they live in.
- They speak various dialects of the Chin-Kuki-Mizo language family, which belong to the Tibeto-Burman branch of the Sino-Tibetan languages.

Centre plans to recall RAF from Manipur

The Union government is considering a phased withdrawal of the Rapid Action Force (RAF), a specialized anti-riot Central armed police force, from violence-hit Manipur.

Key points

- At present, 10 companies of the RAF are deployed in
- An internal report sent by the RAF highlights the crisis.
- The report flags the injudicious use and inappropriate deployment of the RAF in high-risk areas, with the absence of senior police officers and magistrates at the scene of the incidents.

Rapid Action Force (RAF)

- The Rapid Action Force (RAF) is a specialised wing of the Central Reserve Police Force (CRPF) to deal with riot and crowd control situations.
- RAF was raised on 11 December 1991 with headquarters in New Delhi.
- It became fully operational on 7 October 1992, to deal with riots, riot like situations, crowd control, rescue and relief operations, and related unrest.
- Its motto is "Serving Humanity with Sensitive Policing"
- RAF battalions are based in various parts of the country in order to cut down response time and rush the teams in shortest possible time to counter an incident.
- RAF is headed by an officer of the rank of Inspector-General of Police (IGP).
- The RAF has a distinctive uniform with a blue-coloured camouflage pattern which symbolises peace.

Nipah cases: Central team to carry out field investigations in Kozhikode

Gol's Department of Animal Husbandry and Dairying (DAHD), to carry out field investigations in Kozhikode district, Kerala.

Key points

- Nipah is a zoonotic disease affecting both humans and animals.
- The DAHD has directed the team to submit daily reports and advise the Animal Husbandry Department on measures for disease prevention.
- The Central team will be joined by a team from the State Institute for Animal Diseases (SIAD), Palode.
- the State Animal Husbandry department had stepped up surveillance in the livestock sector in view of the cases.



- The department had also issued a set of guidelines for farmers and the public.
- In pigs, for instance, the disease affects the respiratory system and the nervous system.
- Steps were taken to identify pig farms near the epicentre of the outbreak and put them under surveillance for symptoms.

Three Hoysala temples declared World Heritage Sites

The Hoysala temples at Belur, Halebid, and Somanathapura in Karnataka were declared UNESCO World Heritage Sites.

Key points

- The Chennakeshava temple at Belur and the Hoysaleswara temple at Halebid — both in Hassan district — and the Keshava temple at Somanathapura in Mysuru district are given this tag.
- The Hoysala temples are known for their unique temple i.e Stellate plan on raised platform.
- The material used in temple construction is **soapstone**

Chennakeshava Temple, Belur:

- Construction commenced in 1117 AD and took 103 years to complete.
- The temple is dedicated to Lord Vishnu
- Theme on the temple narrates scenes from life of Vishnu and his incarnation and epics of Ramayana and mahabharata and some of shiva

Hoysaleshwara Temple, Halebidu:

- Built in 1121CE during the reign of Vishnuvardhana Hoysaleshwara.
- The temple is dedicated to Shiva,
- It was built by wealthy citizens and merchants of Dwarasamudra.
- Halebid has a walled complex containing three Jaina Basadi (temples) of the Hoysala period as well as a stepped well.

Keshava Temple, Somanathapura:

It is a beautiful Trikuta Temple dedicated to Lord Krishna.



Oldest fossils of a plant-eating dinosaur found in Rajasthan

- Scientists from IIT Roorkee have characterized the dinosaur fossils from the Middle Jurassic period.
- They discovered that they had uncovered remains of a sauropod dinosaur.
- They are the same as Clade, the long-necked herbivores in Jurassic Park.
- It may be the oldest known fossil of this kind.
- These fossils are the first sauropods of the Dicraeosaurus family to have been found in India.
- At 167 million years old, they are the oldest known diplodocus fossils in the world.
- The scientists named the dinosaur Titanosaurus indicus, with Tharo deriving from the Thar desert.

Geological survey of india

Madhya Pradesh Chief Minister Shivraj Singh Chouhan unveiled a gigantic statue of Adi Guru Shankaracharya on the Mandhata hillock at Omkareshwar in Khandwa district.

Key points

- Shankara propagated 'Advaita Vedanta' and 'Dashanami Sampradaya

The Indo-US Task Force aims to increase electronics trade to \$100 billion by 2033.

In a notable effort to strengthen trade ties between India and the United States in the electronics sector, the Indian Cellular and Electronics Association (ICEA) has set up a dedicated task force. With the aim of increasing current India-US electronics trade, currently \$8 billion, to an ambitious \$100 billion in the next decade, the initiative follows the collaborative efforts launched after Prime Minister Narendra Modi's visit to the United States last month.

Tharman Shanmugaratnam won the presidential election of Singapore.

In a significant political development, Indian-origin economist Tharman Shanmugaratnam has won Singapore's presidential election. **Tharman** Shanmugaratnam secured a landslide majority in the presidential election with 70.4 percent of the vote. He beat two other contenders of Chinese descent, Ng Kok Song and Tan Kin Lian, who received 15.7 percent and 13.88 percent of the vote respectively.

Georgia declared October as 'Hindu Heritage Month'.

In an important move, Governor Brian Kemp of the US state of Georgia has officially announced that the month of October will be observed as 'Hindu Heritage Month' in the state. The declaration aligns Georgia with many other states across the United States that have taken similar steps to honor and commemorate Hindu heritage, culture, values and traditions.

- The Wagner Group first surfaced during Russia's annexation of Crimea in 2014.
- Essentially a network of contractors that supply soldiers for hire, the group isn't registered anywhere and its source of funding remains unknown.
- The organisation's owner and head is Yevgeny Prigozhin.
- Apart from Ukraine, Wagner Group is reportedly also active in West Asia and several countries in Africa.
- According to media reports, it provides its services to different governments often in exchange for access to gold and diamond mines.

Black Sea Grain Initiative

- It is associated with the Russia-Ukraine war.
- It was set up to resume vital food and fertilizer exports from Ukraine to the rest of the world.
- It was brokered between Russia and Ukraine by the United Nations and Turkey.

Do you know?

The Initiative allowed exports of grain, other foodstuffs, and fertilizer, including ammonia, to resume through a safe maritime humanitarian corridor from three key Ukrainian ports: Chornomorsk, Odesa, Yuzhny/Pivdennyi, to the rest of the world.

Philippines opposes 'militia vessels' in South China Sea

- An arm of the western Pacific Ocean that borders the Southeast Asian mainland.
- Bordered by Brunei, Cambodia, China, Indonesia, Malaysia, the Philippines Singapore, Taiwan, Thailand and Vietnam.
- It is connected by the Taiwan Strait with the East China Sea and by the Luzon Strait with the Philippine Sea (both marginal seas of the Pacific Ocean).

Comprise three archipelagoes, namely, the Spratly Islands. Paracel Islands, **Pratas** Islands Macclesfield's Bank and Scarborough Shoal.

China slows fertilizer exports, raising concerns in India

- State owned China National Off-shore Company(CNOOC) has decided to proactively decrease exports and channelise the supply to its domestic market.
- This is a concern for India as India imports about 30% of urea needed annually and China is its second largest supplier.

Earthquake in Morocco

- A powerful earthquake of magnitude 6.8 hit the Marrakech and surrounding region in Morocco.
- This is the biggest earthquake in a North African country in 120 years.

Key points

- Most affected province and cities are Al Haouz province and Taroudant, Agadir, Al Hoceima (Mediterranean port city)
- Doctors Without Borders, or MSF offers help which is a charity that provides humanitarian medical care.
- It is a non-governmental organization (NGO) of French origin known for its projects in conflict zones and in countries affected by endemic diseases.
- Such quakes occur due to the "northward convergence" of the African plate with respect to the Eurasian plate along a complex plate boundary".

Did you know?

- Morocco has a coast by the Atlantic Ocean that reaches past the Strait of Gibraltar into the Mediterranean Sea.
- It is bordered by Spain to the north (a water border through the Strait and land borders with three small Spanish-controlled exclaves, Ceuta, Melilla, and Peñón de Vélez de la Gomera), Algeria to the east, and Western Sahara to the south. Since Morocco controls most of Western Sahara, its de facto southern boundary is with Mauritania.

Key points

Former French Colonies Mali, Niger And Burkina Faso **Create Military Alliance**

Leaders of the former French colonies Mali, Burkina Faso and Niger inked a charter to form a military alliance of Sahel states in defiance to the Western nations after overthrowing the ruling governments and forging closer cooperation amongst the Junta rulers.

Key points

- African states have decided to militarily assist each other, individually or collectively to depose external aggression or internal threat to the sovereignty and territorial integrity of their nations.
- The document signed by the three nations read that an "attack on the sovereignty or territorial integrity of one or more parties to the charter will be regarded as aggression against the other parties and will require their assistance, including the use of military force."
- The charter also stated that the signatories would effectively fight terrorism and any organised terror activity in the Sahel states.

India-Middle East-Europe Economic Corridor (IMEC)

A memorandum of understanding (MoU) was signed to establish the 'India-Middle East-Europe Economic Corridor' (IMEC) recently.

IMEC

- IMEC is envisioned as a network of transport corridors comprising railway lines and sea lanes to promote economic integration between Asia, the Arabian Gulf, and Europe.
- This initiative is part of the Partnership for Global Infrastructure Investment (PGII).
- It aims to fund infrastructure projects in developing countries through public and private investments, offering an alternative to the BRI.

Countries Involved - India, Saudi Arabia, UAE Countries, USA, European Union, Germany, Italy and France and Israel through port.

Key Facts:

- 1. Currently all trade between India and Europe happens via sea route through the Suez Canal.
- 2. Due to the corridor, Indian goods can reach Europe in 10 days - 40% faster than the Suez Canal.
- 3. Ports involved:
 - India Kandla, Mundhra and Javaharlal Nehru port
 - Saudi Arabia: Damman and Ras Al Khair
 - UAE Countries Fujairah, Jebel Ali and Abu Dhabi.
 - Israel Haifa
 - European Messina (Italy), Masseille(France) and Piraeus(Greece).

Though Israel and the UAE are part of this corridor, they were rivals for a long time. And have signed the Abraham Accord to conclude peace.

International North–South Transport Corridor (INSTC)

- The International North-South Transport Corridor (INSTC) is the multimodal freight transportation corridor among India, Russia, Iran, Europe, and Central Asia.
- The corridor spans around 7200 km.
- The primary goal of INSTC is to enhance connectivity and promote trade and economic cooperation among these regions

India's GDP growth accelerated to 7.8% in the April-June quarter.

India's gross domestic product (GDP) showed strong growth, rising to 7.8% in the first quarter of FY 2023-2024, compared to 6.1% growth recorded in the previous January-March quarter of FY 2022-23. This acceleration is indicative of a positive economic trajectory and has a major impact on the country's economic scenario.

The Centre's fiscal deficit for April-July stood at 33.9% of the FY2024 target.

- In the first four months of the 2023-24 fiscal year, India's fiscal deficit has exceeded one-third of the full-year target. This fiscal imbalance, measured as the difference between government expenditure and revenue, is a critical indicator of the government's borrowing needs.
- According to data from the Comptroller General of Accounts (CGA), the fiscal deficit in absolute terms stood at Rs 6.06 lakh crore at the end of July.
- This represents a significant increase over the corresponding period of the previous financial year, where the deficit stood at 20.5% of the Budget Estimates (BE).

Moody's raised India's GDP growth forecast to 6.7% in 2023.

Global rating agency Moody's Investors Service has revised its economic growth forecast for India, providing a positive outlook for 2023. The agency raised India's gross domestic product (GDP) growth forecast to 6.7 percent from the earlier estimate of 5.5 percent. The adjustment is attributed to a remarkable performance in the second quarter, with real GDP growth of 7.8 percent over the previous year, driven by strong expansion in services and capital spending.

India's August GST collection rose to ₹1.59 trillion

- In August, India saw a significant increase in Goods and Services Tax (GST) collections, which stood at ₹1.59 trillion, representing an 11% increase over the same period last year.
- August 2023 collection is a significant increase from ₹1.43 trillion collected in August 2022.



India's UPI reached a historic milestone in August by crossing 10 billion monthly transactions, showing a year-on-year growth of over 50%.

India's Unified Payments Interface (UPI) has reached a milestone by crossing 10 billion monthly transactions in August. This achievement has been confirmed by the National Payments Corporation of India (NPCI), a nonprofit agency of the Reserve Bank. UPI is the key driver of digital payments in India and its rapid growth is significant.

RBI Governor Shaktikanta Das received 'A+' rating in **Global Finance Central Banker Report.**

In a recent announcement that attracted international attention, Reserve Bank of India (RBI) Governor Shaktikanta Das has been given an 'A+' rating in the prestigious Global Finance Central Banker Report Cards 2023. This accolade puts him at the top of the world's central bank governors. RBI made this announcement through its official communication channel on social media platform 'X' (earlier known as Twitter).

The Reserve Bank of India reported a 5.1% year-on-year increase in the All-India House Price Index (HPI) for **O1FY24.**

The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) has unveiled its latest data, showing a significant increase in the All-India House Price Index (HPI). In the April-June quarter of the financial year 2023-24, the HPI recorded a robust growth of 5.1%. This is a significant increase compared to the 3.4% increase during the same period last year.

CBDCs

- A Central Bank Digital Currency (CBDC), or national digital currency, is simply the digital form of a country's fiat currency.
- Instead of printing paper currency or minting coins, the central bank issues electronic tokens.
- This token value is backed by the full faith and credit of the government.
- It is also known as National Digital Currency.

India's forex reserves jump \$4.03 bn to \$598.89 bn

- According to the recent reports by Reserve Bank India's foreign currency assets rose by \$3.442 billion to \$530.691 billion
- Gold reserves rose \$584 million to \$44.939 billion.
- Special Drawing Rights climbed by \$1 million to \$18.195 billion.
- India's reserve position with the IMF rose \$12 million to \$5.073 billion.

RBI decides to discontinue I-CCR in a phased manner.

- The Incremental Cash Reserve Ratio will be discontinued in a phased manner.
- The measure was intended to absorb surplus liquidity generated by various factors, including the return of Rs.2000 notes to the banking system.

India's goods exports shrink for the seventh successive month

- India's goods exports and also services exports are shrinking, while its imports have increased.
- When a country imports more goods than what it exports, it would have a "deficit" on its trade account. In other words, more money is going out of the country than coming in via the trade of physical goods. Hence, India's current account deficit is likely to widen.

What is Trade Deficit?

- Simply put, trade deficit or negative balance of trade (BOT) is the gap between exports and imports.
- When money spent on imports exceeds that spent on exports in a country, trade deficit occurs.

Non-Fungible Tokens (NFTs)

- NFTs are unique cryptographic tokens that exist on a blockchain and cannot be replicated.
- They can represent digital or real-world items like artwork, photograph, song, video, real estate, individuals' identities, property rights, and more.
- Thus, NFTs are assets that have been tokenized via a blockchain.
- They are assigned unique identification codes and metadata that distinguish them from other tokens.
- NFTs can be traded and exchanged for money, cryptocurrencies, or other NFTs

Centre softens angel tax rules

- A term used to refer to the income tax payable on the capital raised by unlisted companies.
- It is levied on the capital raised via the issue of shares from an Indian investor.
- This tax predominantly affects start-ups and the angel investments they attract.
- It derives its genesis from section 56(2) (viib) of the Income Tax Act, 1961.

In news

The government has eased some of the provisions of the angel tax introduced in this year's Budget on investments into start-ups by non-resident investors at a premium over their fair market value.

G20 (Group of 20)

Argentina, Australia, Brazil, Canada, China, France, Germany, India, Indonesia, Italy, Japan, South Korea, Mexico, Russia, Saudi Arabia, South Africa, Turkey, the United Kingdom, the United States and the European Union.

Key points:

- The G20 or Group of Twenty is an intergovernmental forum comprising 19 countries and the European Union (EU).
- The G20 is composed of most of the world's largest including both industrialized economies, and developing nations.
- G20 Grouping accounts for around 90% of gross world product (GWP), 75-80% of international trade, twothirds of the global population, and roughly half the world's land area.

Background:

- G20 was **founded in 1999** in response to several world economic crises.
- Since 2008, it has convened at least once a year, with summits involving each member's head of government or state, finance minister, foreign minister, and other high-ranking officials; the EU is represented by the European Commission and the European Central Bank.

18th G20 Summit 2023

- To be held in New Delhi (September 9 and 10)
- Chinese President for the first time may skip a G-20 summit.
- It will be attended by delegates from 40 countries (including the 20 member states)
- It will focus on global solutions based on the theme of "Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam," meaning One Earth, One Family, One Future.
- The theme highlights unity, sustainability, and cleaner living.

Critical global issues during 18th G20 Summit 2023

Focus areas: Green development, climate finance, including Low-carbon Technologies for Fighting Epidemics (LiFE), economic growth across all segments of society, accelerating progress towards the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), and women's empowerment.

BRICS

BRICS is an acronym for the grouping of the world's leading emerging economies, namely Brazil, Russia, India, China, and South Africa.

- In 2001, the British Economist Jim O'Neill coined the term BRIC to describe the four emerging economies of Brazil, Russia, India, and China.
- The grouping was formalized during the first meeting of BRIC Foreign Ministers in 2006.
- South Africa was invited to join BRIC in December 2010, after which the group adopted the acronym BRICS.
- BRICS marked its 15th summit by expanding its membership from five to eleven countries, reflecting a concerted effort to enhance its global standing.
- Egypt, Iran, Saudi Arabia, UAE, Ethiopia, and Argentina joined the BRICS fold, amplifying the group's representation across the Middle East, Africa, and South America.
- Full membership will take effect on January 1, 2024.

Why in the news?

East Asia Summit (EAS)

PM attended the 20th ASEAN-India Summit and the 18th East Asia Summit (EAS) in Jakarta on 7 September 2023.

About EAS

- EAS was established in 2005 as an Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN)-led initiative.
- EAS is the only leader-led forum in the Indo-Pacific that brings together all key partners to discuss political, security and economic issues of strategic importance.
- The idea of an East Asia Grouping was first proposed by then Malaysian Prime Minister Mahathir Mohamad in 1991.
- The first summit was held in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia on 14 December 2005.

Members:

The EAS comprises 18 members: the 10 ASEAN countries (Brunei, Cambodia, Indonesia, Laos, Malaysia, Myanmar, Philippines, Singapore, Thailand, and Vietnam) and eight dialogue partners (Australia, China, India, Japan, New Zealand, Republic of Korea, Russia and the United States).

Global Biofuel Alliance

- Global Biofuel Alliance is one of the priorities under India's G20 Presidency, under which Brazil, India, and the United States, will work together during the next few months towards the development of a Global Biofuels Alliance along with other interested countries.
- The Alliance shall work in collaboration with and complement the relevant existing regional and international agencies as well as initiatives in the bioenergy, bioeconomy, and energy transition fields more broadly, including the Clean Energy Ministerial Biofuture Platform, the Mission Innovation Bioenergy initiatives, and the Global Bioenergy Partnership (GBEP).

The unofficial track comprises engagement or civil groups.

Schemes and Committees News

PMUY (Pradhan Mantri Ujjwala Yojana)

- Scheme by the Ministry of Petroleum & Natural Gas.
- It provides LPG connections to women from Below Poverty Line (BPL) households.
- The scheme was originally launched on May 1, 2016, in Uttar Pradesh by the PM with a target of releasing 8 crore connections by March 2020.
- During Ujjwala 1.0, a target was set to provide LPG connections to 5 crore women members of BPL households.
- Subsequently, the scheme was expanded in April 2018 to include women beneficiaries from seven more categories (SC/ST, PMAY, AAY, Most backward classes, tea garden, forest dwellers, Islands).
- Also, the target was revised to 8 Crore LPG connections.
- The PMUY 2.0 was launched in the financial year 2021-22 making a provision for the release of additional one crore connections.
- It is a centrally sponsored scheme.

- The 'Ayushman Bhav' campaign is a comprehensive nationwide healthcare initiative that aims to provide saturation coverage of healthcare services, reaching every village and town in the country.

PMMSY: bridging gaps in the fisheries sector

PM Matsay Sampada Yojana (PMMSY)

- It is a flagship scheme for focused and sustainable development of the fisheries sector in the country with an estimated investment of 20,050 crore for its implementation during 2020-21 to 2024-25 as part of Aatmanirbhar Bharat package.
- Ministry: Fisheries, Animal Husbandry and Dairying

Aim:

- To bring about a blue revolution through sustainable and responsible development of the fisheries sector in India.
- To double the incomes of fishers and fish farmers, reducing post-harvest losses from 20-25% to about 10% and the generation of gainful employment opportunities in the sector.



Implementation:

- It is implemented as an umbrella scheme with two separate components namely
- Central Sector Scheme: The project cost will be borne by the Central government. The entire project/unit cost will be funded by the Government of India (GoI) (i.e., 100% Gol Funding).
- Αll Centrally Sponsored Scheme: subthe components/activities will be implemented by the States/UTs and the cost will be shared between Centre and State.
- North Eastern & Himalayan States: 90% Central share and 10% State share.
- Other States: 60% Central share and 40% State share.

Genetic Engineering Assessment Committee (GEAC)

- GEAC was formed to regulate GM crop research, testing, food safety, and organism release.
- GEAC is constituted under the Environment Protection Act of 1986.
- It is India's main biotech regulatory body.
- GEAC was established by the Indian Ministry of **Environment** and Forests department.

Jal Jeevan Mission (JJM)

- JJM is Gol's ₹3.6 lakh crore scheme that aims to provide piped water to every village home by 2024.
- Vision To provide drinking water supply to every rural household in adequate quantity of prescribed quality on regular and long-term basis.
- It comes under Jal Shakti Ministry.

PM launches Vishwakarma scheme

- It is a **Central Sector Scheme** with a financial outlay of Rs.13,000 crore.
- **Time period:** Five years (FY 2023-24 to FY 2027-28).
- **Aim:** To strengthen and nurture the Guru-Shishya parampara or family-based practice of traditional skills by artisans and craftspeople working with their hands and tools.
- The scheme also aims at improving the quality, as well as the reach of products and services of artisans and craftspeople and to ensure that the Vishwakarmas are integrated with the domestic and global value chains.
- Under this scheme, the artisans and craftspeople will be provided recognition through PM Vishwakarma certificate and ID card, Credit Support upto Rs.1 lakh (First Tranche) and Rs.2 lakh (Second Tranche) with a concessional interest rate of 5%.
- The Scheme will further provide Skill Upgradation, Toolkit Incentive, Incentive for Digital Transactions and Marketing Support.
- Under the scheme, there will be two types of skilling programmes -- Basic and Advanced and a stipend of Rs 500 per day will also be provided to beneficiaries while undergoing skills training.

Viacom 18 secured BCCI TV and digital media rights in a 5-year deal worth Rs 5,963 crore.

- Viacom 18, a Reliance-owned media outlet, has won the auction for the media rights, covering digital and TV broadcast of India's domestic matches and BCCI-hosted domestic tournaments, for the next five years. The auction was held on 31 August 2023. This significant acquisition complements Viacom 18's existing digital rights for Indian Premier League (IPL) and FIFA World Cup rights for India.
- Viacom 18 faced stiff competition from Sony Sports Network and Star Sports in the bidding process. For the 88 matches scheduled between 2023 and 2028, the BCCI has fixed a base price of Rs 20 crore per match for TV rights and Rs 25 crore per match for digital rights, totaling Rs 3,960 crore.

CCI clears Air India-Vistara merger.

The Competition Commission of India (CCI) recently gave the green light to the merger of Tata SIA Airlines, which operates under the E Vistara brand, with Air India, a subsidiary of Tata Sons Private Limited. The landmark merger also includes Singapore Airlines (SIA) and acquisition of shares in the merged entity Air India subject to certain voluntary commitments. TSAL (Tata SIA Airlines Limited) is a joint venture between the Tata Group and Singapore Airlines with the former owning 51% and the latter 49%.

Rashtriya Chemicals and Fertilizers got Navratna **Company status.**

Department of Public Enterprises (DPE) has awarded 'Navaratna Status' to Rashtriya Chemicals and Fertilizers (RCF). Navratna is a group of public sector companies that have financial freedom to invest up to Rs 1000 crore without the need for central government approval. Earlier, the company had received 'Miniratna status' from the Department of Public Enterprises.

Cheetah project on the right path of success: govt. Report

A government report was released on the completion of one year of the programme. It says that the project is on the right path to becoming a successful large carnivore conservation, translocation, and populationestablishment endeavour. Four of the six criteria established for assessing the short-term success of India's cheetah reintroduction programme have already been met

Key points

- The Cheetah Action Plan, published last year, lists six short-term success criteria: survival of 50% of the introduced cheetahs for the first year; establishment of home ranges in the Kuno National Park; successful cheetah reproduction in the wild; survival of wild-born cheetah cubs past one year; successful first-generation breeding; and cheetah-based revenues contributing to community livelihoods.
- The report noted that the project achieved 50% survival; establishment of home ranges; birth of cubs; and direct revenue contributions to local communities through the engagement of cheetah trackers and indirect appreciation of land value in surrounding areas.

Evasive nutritional support for TB patients

- According to recent report, Undernutrition is the leading risk factor for TB disease.
- Undernutrition contributes to 55% of annual TB incidence in India.
- 45% of people in India are undernourished, accounting for nearly 1.2 million TB cases each year.

Nikshay Poshan Yojna

- The NPY was launched in 2018 by the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare.
- It aims to support every Tuberculosis (TB) Patient by providing a Direct Benefit Transfer (DBT) of Rs 500 per month for nutritional needs.

Nikshay Mitra Initiative

- It is an initiative under Pradhan Mantri TB Mukt Bharat Abhiyaan.
- Aimed to provide aid to TB-afflicted patients on three levels of nutritional, additional diagnostic, and vocational support.

Objective:

- It aims to eradicate the existing societal stigma and discrimination against TB patients and provide them with much-needed nutritional and social support, and help them lead a normal life.
- It also aims to encourage elected representatives, corporates, NGOs, and individuals to come forward as donors/sponsors to help the patients complete their journey toward recovery.

WHO releases report on global impact of high BP

- World Health Organization (WHO) released its first-ever report on hypertension.
- According to report four of every five people with hypertension are not adequately treated

ISRO launches Aditya L1 mission.

- ISRO successfully launched the Aditya L1 mission on September 2, 2023 at 11:50 AM IST from the Satish Dhawan Space Center in Sriharikota, India. The mission is India's first dedicated solar mission and will study the Sun's atmosphere, including the chromosphere and corona.
- The Aditya L1 spacecraft is a 1.5 ton satellite equipped with seven payloads. The payloads will study the Sun's atmosphere using a variety of methods, including remote sensing and in-situ measurements. The spacecraft will be placed in a halo orbit around the Sun-Earth Lagrange Point 1 (L1), which is about 1.5 million kilometers from Earth. COVAX

- It is co-led by the Coalition for Epidemic Preparedness Innovations (CEPI), the Global Alliance for Vaccines and Immunization (GAVI) and the World Health Organisation (WHO).
- Aim: To accelerate the development and manufacture of Covid-19 vaccines and to guarantee fair and equitable access for every country in the world.
- COVAX is the vaccines pillar of the Access to Covid-19 Tools (ACT) Accelerator.
- The ACT Accelerator is a global collaboration to accelerate the development, production, and equitable access to Covid-19 tests, treatments, and vaccines.

Genetic engineering gives mosquito control an upgrade

- Scientists now have access to the whole genome sequences of multiple mosquito species, allowing us to genetically manipulate them.
- Gene-drive technology is one such approach, which has been used in outdoor trials in India, Brazil, and Panama

Key points

- The fundamental idea behind genetic manipulation of mosquitoes is to systematically control their populations by interfering with their reproduction.
- Scientists worldwide have developed various genetic modification approaches. A major one in this endeavour is gene-drive technology.

Gene-drive technology

- This technology was conceived by Austin Burt, professor at Imperial College London, in a 2003 paper published in Royal Society Proceedings.
- In 2020 a genetically modified mosquito called OX5034 was released in counties in Florida and Texas.
- Genetically modified male OX5034 mosquitoes mated with female mosquitoes but the self-limiting gene prevented female offspring from surviving. Male would then disappear from mosquitoes environment after around a dozen generations.

Mosquito-borne diseases

Malaria, Dengue/Dengue Hemorrhagic fever (DHF), Lymphatic Filariasis (Elephantiasis), Kala-azar/Visceral Leishmaniasis (VL), Japanese Encephalitis (JE), and Chikungunya.

What are picoflare jets?

Researchers studying the findings of the Solar Orbiter Aircraft, a joint mission by the European Space Agency and the U.S. space agency NASA, recently announced that they had detected small jets of charged particles that were being expelled in intermittent fashion from the outer regions of the sun's outer atmosphere.

Key points

- 'Picoflare jets' could be a source of the solar wind, which have important effects on the solar system at large as well as on the earth's magnetic field.
- A solar wind is a high-speed stream of charged particles from the sun, but their exact origin remains unclear.

Indian space start-ups say funding is the topmost challenge

Funding is the biggest challenge the Indian space industry is facing today and therefore, the government should consider setting up soft funds and additional incentives to turbo charge the growth of the sector, said space start-ups and ecosystem players.

Key points

The sector was all set for huge growth with clarity emerging on the regulation front.



- However, funding remained an issue although venture capital firms had been showing interest to invest in the sector, observed experts at the International Conference on Space 2023
- Some eight niche areas have been identified as key drivers of the space sector, which has the potential to become a \$44-billion industry in the next 10 years, from \$8 billion
- some 95% of the components for space solutions, equipment and products are imported.

Gravitational instabilities could affect evolution of galaxies

A study conducted by the Indian Institute of Astrophysics (IIA) could help understand how gravitational instabilities are connected to galaxy evolution.

Key points

- The study compared the star formation rate, gas fraction, and timescale for the growth of gravitational instabilities of nearby galaxies
- It also investigated the stability levels of a sample of 175 galaxies taken from the Spitzer Photometry and Accurate Rotation Curves (SPARC) database.
- This Study can help the researchers trace the role of dark matter in regulating the stability levels of the galaxies

Did you know?

The study, which compared the stability levels in the nearby galaxies, could help to understand the role of gravitational instabilities in the evolution of galaxies

Genome sequencing

- Genome sequencing is figuring out the order of DNA nucleotides, or bases, in a genome.
- It has the order of Adenine, Cytosine, Guanines, and Thymine that make up an organism's DNA.
- It is the process that involves deciphering the exact order of base pairs in an individual. This "deciphering" or reading of the genome is what sequencing is all about.

Advantages

- Early diagnostic and targeted treatment of disease
- Genetic risk of developing disease can be detected earlier helps manage inherited disease
- It can guide specific lifestyle changes and can prevent the appearance of certain diseases.

Galactic tides

- Tides experienced by the universe's galaxies are called Galactic tides.
- Galactic tides are caused by gravitational forces within a galaxy,
- They arise due to the interactions between celestial objects such as stars and gas clouds.
- They can reshape a galaxy structure by creating tidal tails and bridges, promoting star formation, and disrupting smaller star systems.

Did you know?

The Andromeda galaxy is heading towards the Milky Way at 110 km/s and will collide in four billion years.

 NASA's first asteroid samples of Bennu were fetched from deep space parachuted into the Utah desert

OSIRIS-Rex Mission:

- The Origins Spectral Interpretation Resource Identification Security - Regolith Explorer was launched by NASA in 2016 for the journey to Bennu.
- The spacecraft travelled to a near-Earth asteroid named Bennu and brought back a sample to Earth for study.
- The mission will help scientists investigate how planets formed and how life began, as well as improve our understanding of asteroids that could impact Earth.

Disease X

- It could be related to zoonotic disease likely an RNA virus, emerging from an area where the epidemiological triad - environment host favours sustained transmission.

Section 67A of the Information Technology Act is in news as the Supreme Court is examining the use of vulgar language in a YouTube series or OTT platform amounts to a "sexually explicit act".



Key points:

- Section 67 of the IT Act provides for punishment for publishing or transmitting obscene material in electronic form.
- Section 67A of the IT Act stipulates punishment for publishing or transmitting of material containing sexually explicit acts, etc.

U.K. and New York-based KX, has entered the Indian market with software offerings to help enterprises and developers harness the full potential of generative AI (GenAI).

Generative Al

- Generative Artificial Intelligence is a type of AI system that can create new content or data that resembles human-made content, such as text, images, music, code, etc.
- It works by using neural networks to learn from large amounts of data and then generate outputs based on the patterns and rules it has learned.

Key points

- A clean-up drive at Crow Island beach (Sri Lanka) was jointly undertaken by India's INS and Sri Lanka's SLN.

- As part of India's 'Aarogya Maitri' initiative, which aims to provide essential medical supplies to friendly countries, the High Commissioner of India to Sri Lanka, Gopal Baglay, presented a state-of-the-art Arogya Maitri Cube to the Speaker of Sri Lanka Parliament.
- These medical cubes have been indigenously developed under the Project BHISHM (Bharat Health Initiative for Sahyog Hita and Maitri).

- Both the leaders welcomed the completion process of a commercial agreement between General Electric Aerospace and Hindustan Aeronautics Ltd.(HAL) to manufacture GE F-414 jet engines of India.

Of these 90 projects, 36 are in Arunachal Pradesh, 26 in Ladakh, 11 in Jammu & Kashmir, five in Mizoram, three in Himachal Pradesh, two each in Sikkim, Uttarakhand and West Bengal and one each in Nagaland, Rajasthan, and Andaman and Nicobar Islands.

Water Hyacinth

- Water hyacinth (Pontederia crassipes) is an invasive species native to South Africa.
- The plant has naturalised itself in many other parts of the world.
- Water hyacinth acts as a water purifier by removing heavy metals from water when present in small quantities.
- However, the plant is a prolific spreader and when it covers the entire surface of a water body, it does not allow sunlight to penetrate the water and also starts depleting oxygen.
- This leads to death of aquatic animals and plants, which in turn decompose and further reduce oxygen levels



- The presence of water hyacinth indicates that there are high nitrogen levels in the water.
- It is a symptom of an underlying problem and how the water nutrients behave.

Crocodiles (Mugger or Marsh Crocodile)

- An egg-laying and hole-nesting species, also known to be dangerous.
- Mainly restricted to the Indian subcontinent where it may be found in a number of freshwater habitat types and also in coastal saltwater lagoons and estuaries.
- It is already extinct in Bhutan and Myanmar.

Estuarine or Saltwater Crocodile:

- Considered as the Earth's largest living crocodile species, infamous globally as a known maneater.

- Also found across Southeast Asia and northern Australia.

Gharial:

- Sometimes called gavials, are a type of Asian crocodilian distinguished by their long, thin snouts which resembles a pot (ghara in Hindi).
- The population of Gharials is a good indicator of clean river water.
- Known to be a relatively harmless, fish-eating species.
- Mostly found in fresh waters of the himalayan rivers.
- The Chambal river in the northern slopes of the Vindhya mountains (Madhya Pradesh) is known as the primary habitat of gharials.
- Other himalayan rivers like Ghagra, Gandak river, Girwa river, Ramganga river and the Sone river are secondary habitats.

India's suicides facts

Housewives make up over 50% of India's female suicides.

- Highest suicide rates are in the south compared to the north states.
- According to National Crime Records Bureau (2021 Study) - The number of women who died by suicide in India reached a peak of 45,026 in 2021.
- Housewives make up over 50% of India's female suicides.
- 35% of married women in poorest households had faced some form of abuse.
- Over 30% of all suicides (men and women) were due to issues relating to family or marriage.
- When we look at suicide deaths, the highest suicide rates are in the south. There is more societal pressure in these states to have a successful life. The thing is that a state with a high level of education also brings a higher level of expectations. And when those expectations are unmet the frustration level is higher.
- In the south, where female literacy rates are comparatively high and women have greater access to mass media, there tends to be a clash between modern perspectives and traditional societal norms. In contrast, the push back against traditional expectations is less pronounced in the north, partly due to lower levels of exposure among women

Key point

The fund will be used in areas of renewable energy, transmission infrastructure, developing electric vehicle infrastructure, green infrastructure, water treatment, decarbonisation industrial transport and decarbonisation.

For sickle cell patients, an elusive disability certificate

- A plan to issue permanent disability certificates to those above the age of five with sickle-cell disease has been stuck in a quagmire at three Union Ministries for nearly three years.
- In a report tabled during the Monsoon Session of Parliament, a Standing Committee of Parliament urged the government to take a quick decision.

Key points

- The Health Ministry is responsible for determining the criteria and rules for disability certificates, while the Social Justice and Empowerment Ministry issues the certificates, which are required for getting reservation and benefits of schemes.
- Given that sickle cell disease, a debilitating genetic blood disorder, is especially prevalent among tribal populations across India, the Tribal Affairs Ministry is keen on ensuring that the certificates are issued to patients with chronic anaemia, pain, and complications arising out of tissue and organ damage.

Key points about Moonquakes

- It is seismic tremors or vibrations that occur on the Moon's surface.
- It is less intense than earthquakes on Earth.
- The strongest moonquakes can reach magnitudes of up to 5.5 on the Richter scale, but most are much weaker.
- It is measured using seismometers placed on the Moon's surface by Apollo missions.
- It has helped scientists learn about the Moon's internal structure, composition, and history.

Did you know?

- The Moon has quakes too. They're not called earthquakes but moonquakes. They are caused by the gravitational influence of the Earth.
- Unlike quakes on Earth that last only a few minutes at most, moonquakes can last up to half an hour. They are much weaker than earthquakes though.

Alternative Dispute Resolution(ADR)

The process of resolving conflicts through negotiation between parties without going to the courts is known as alternative dispute resolution (ADR).

Modes of Alternative Dispute Resolution

Arbitration

- Arbitration is a process in which the parties dispute is presented to an arbitral tribunal,
- The award of ruling is binding on the parties involved.

Mediation

- In mediation, a third party who is impartial to both sides of the conflict works with the parties to arrive at an agreeable resolution.
- It is a voluntary informal, out-of-court settlement,
- The outcome is not always legally binding.

Conciliation

- Conciliation is a way of settling disputes where the parties work with a conciliator to reach an agreement.
- The conciliator's job is to get the parties to agree to put their differences aside and come to a mutually agreeable settlement on the terms.

Did you know?

The arbitration and conciliation act was last amended in 2021

Kafala system

What is the Kafala System?

- It is a sponsorship system that binds migrant workers to one employer
- It is practiced in many countries of West Asia Like Gulf countries
- It emerged in the 1950s
- objective to provide temporary and rotating laborers in the period of economic boom.
- The Kafala system based on migrant workers, employer and contractual period
- A migrant worker is legally bound to his employer.
- A worker cannot enter or leave the country without permission of the employer

ILO report called it modern-day slavery.
