#### **National News**

The Chief Election Commissioner and Other Election Commissioners (Appointment, Conditions of Office, and Terms of Office) Bill, 2023 was passed by the Rajya Sabha.

- The Chief Election Commissioner and Other Election Commissioners (Appointment, Conditions of Office, and Terms of Office) Bill, 2023 was passed by the Rajya Sabha.
- The Bill lays out the process for naming the Chief Election Commissioner (CEC) and two Election Commissioners (ECs).
- The Election Commission of India (ECI), comprising the CEC and two ECs, is established under Article 324 of the Constitution.
- The President is authorized under the Constitution to nominate the CEC and subject to parliamentary approval.
- In response to a PIL, the Supreme Court declared in March 2023 that there is a legislative vacuum regulating the nomination procedure.
- The Supreme Court proposed a committeebased selection process that would include the Prime Minister, Chief Justice of India, and Leader of the Opposition.
- Previously there was no separate committee of selecting the Election Commissioners.

#### **About**

- The proposed law establishes an organized framework with a search and selection committees, but it excludes the CJI from the process.
- Individuals holding positions comparable to the rank of Secretary to the Government of India shall be appointed as CECs and ECs.
- The Prime Minister, the Leader of the Opposition, and a Union Cabinet Minister recommended by the Prime Minister make up the selection committee.
- The mechanism of the Bill differs from worldwide standards, with differences in selection processes in nations such as South Africa, the United Kingdom, and the United States.

- While the Bill improves the selection process, it is criticized for favouring the existing administration.
- Retaining the Chief Justice of India (CJI) on the selection committee, as indicated by the Supreme Court, might provide more independence.
- The Bill is expected to become law, and unanimous choices by the selection committee may boost public trust in the Election Commission of India (ECI).

# LS passes Bills to replace British-era criminal laws

- The Lok Sabha passed three amended Bills that seek to repeal and replace criminal laws which date back to colonial times.
- This criminal law reform brings terrorism offences into a general crime law for the first time, drops the crime of sedition, and makes mob lynching punishable by death.

# **Key replacements**

- The Bharatiya Nyaya (Second) Sanhita Bill (BNSS) will replace the Indian Penal Code, 1860:
- the Bharatiya Sakshya (Second) Bill (BSS)
   will replace the Indian Evidence Act, 1872;
   and
- The Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha (Second) Sanhita Bill (BNSSS) replaced the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1898.

#### **Key points**

- Indian Penal Code (IPC) is the official criminal code of India drafted in 1860 in the wake of the first law commission established in 1834 under the Charter Act of 1833.
- Code of Criminal Procedure (CrPC) provides procedures for administering criminal law in India. It was enacted in 1973 and became effective on 1 April 1974.
- The Indian Evidence Act, originally passed in India by the Imperial Legislative Council in 1872, during the British Raj, contains a set of rules and allied issues governing admissibility of evidence in the Indian courts of law.





#### Telecom Bill 2023

The Lok Sabha passed the **Telecom Bill, 2023**, which will replace existing laws, including the **138-year-old Indian Telegraph Act.** 

# **Key points**

- The Bill seeks to reform and simplify the regulatory and licensing regime for telecommunications and remove bottlenecks in creating telecom infrastructure.
- It also allows the government to temporarily take control of telecom services in the interest of national security and provide a nonauction route for the allocation of satellite spectrum.
- The Telecom Bill, 2023 provides a mechanism to exercise the right of way for laying telecom infrastructure in public as well as private property.

# Lok Sabha passes Bill on CEC, EC appointment

- The Lok Sabha passed the Chief Election Commissioner and Other Election Commissioners (Appointment, Conditions of Service and Term of Office) Bill, 2023
- The Bill had been passed by the Rajya Sabha already.

#### About

- The Bill replaces the Election Commission (Conditions of Service of Election Commissioners and Transaction of Business) Act, 1991.
- It addresses the appointment, salary, and removal of the CEC and ECs
- The legislation aims to bring transparency to the appointment process, responding to a directive from the Supreme Court of India in the Anoop Baranwal v Union of India case, 2023.

# Bill to replace the PRB Act

- Parliament passed the Press and Registration of Periodicals Bill to make the process of allotment of title and registration of periodicals simple through an online system without the requirement of physical interface.
- It replaces the Press and Registration of Books Act, 1867.

## **Raigad Fort**

- Raigad Fort lies in the Sahyadri mountains of Maharashtra, India,
- It is a powerful symbol of **Maratha pride** and resilience.
- It was built in the 17th century by the legendary Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj
- This impregnable fortress served as the capital of the Maratha Empire for nearly three decades, witnessing the rise and glory of one of India's most celebrated rulers.

# **Foreign investors prefer Maharashtra**

- Maharashtra remains the top destination for foreign direct investment (FDI) in India, attracting investments worth ₹28,868 crore in the last three months.
- There is also an **anticipation** of investment of around **₹35,000** crore in the Raigad district.

# **Elephanta Caves**

- The Elephanta Caves, also known as Gharapurichi Lenī (Caves of Gharapuri), are a group of rock-cut temples located on Elephanta Island, off the coast of Mumbai
- These caves are carved out of a single basalt rock face
- Elephanta caves are a UNESCO World Heritage Site
- The caves are believed to have been excavated between the 5th and 7th centuries CE, during the reign of the Kalachuri dynasty.
- The caves are dedicated to the Hindu god Shiva, with various depictions of his forms and stories.

#### Paithani sarees

Paithani sarees are exquisite handloom silk sarees, woven with intricate gold zari work, originating from Paithan, a town in Maharashtra

- They are often called "Queen of Silks" for their regal splendor and intricate weaving techniques.
- These sarees are renowned for their vibrant colors, and luxurious texture, making them coveted possessions and prized heirlooms.
- These sarees are traditionally woven with pure mulberry silk





 The intricate zari (gold or silver thread) woven patterns showcasing birds, lotus flowers, paisleys, and geometric designs.

## **Chanakya Centre for Excellence**

- The Maharashtra Tourism Development Corporation will build the 'Chanakya Centre for Excellence' at Karla, Lonavala.
- The centre will include amenities such as a convention hall, exhibition centre, adventure sports arena and waterpark, tent city, a 42 feet tall statue of Chanakya, a museum, and a wellness centre.
- This centre will showcase Arya Chanakya's political theory, economic thought, war strategies, lifestyle, and other philosophical ideas.

## A new city called 'Third Mumbai'

- The MH state government has finalized a broad skeletal proposal for developing a new city called the 'Third Mumbai'.
- Aim is to provide better housing, infrastructure and robust transport facilities to the growing population of the Mumbai Metropolitan Region (MMR)
- The city is proposed around the Navi Mumbai International Airport
- It will be linked to Mumbai by the crucial connector Atal Bihari Vajpayee Sewri-Nhava Sheva Atal Setu, also known as Mumbai Trans Harbour Link (MTHL).

## Kolhapur jaggery

- Kolhapur jaggery is a natural sweetener produced in the Kolhapur district of Maharashtra
- It has a unique taste, aroma, and health benefits.
- It earned the prestigious Geographical Indication (GI) tag in 2014
- It is made from organically grown sugarcane cultivated on the fertile banks of Panchganga and Krishna rivers.
- Sugarcane juice is boiled and clarified using natural agents like okra and lime, then concentrated and molded into blocks.
- It is rich in iron, calcium, phosphorus, potassium, and minerals.
- It has a source of antioxidants and aids digestion.

#### Lezim dance

- Lezim is a vibrant and energetic folk dance form originating from Maharashtra
- It is traditionally performed by women during festive occasions like Ganesh Chaturthi, Navratri, and weddings.
- The word "Lezim" is derived from the Marathi word "Lezimga," which means "to play."
- Lezim is performed by a group of women, typically ranging from 10 to 50 participants.
- The dance is accompanied by energetic drumming on dholkis (cylindrical drums) and sometimes tasha (kettledrums).
- The choreography involves synchronized steps, claps, and movements of the hands and arms.
- The dancers stand in two lines facing each other, creating a lively and visually engaging performance.
- Traditional lezim attire typically consists of colorful saris or ghagra-choli sets, adorned with ornaments like ghungroos (ankle bells).

# **Ajinkyatara Fort**

- The Ajinkyatara Fort, also known as the Sinhagad Fort, stands sentinel atop a 2,130foot-high peak in the Sahyadri mountain range near Pune, Maharashtra
- It was built in the 17th century by Shivaji,
- Ajinkyatara Fort played a crucial role in numerous battles.
- Its sturdy walls, fortified gates, and strategically placed cannons repelled several Mughal attacks, solidifying its status as a symbol of Maratha resistance.
- The fort changed hands multiple times throughout its history, witnessing the power struggles between the Marathas, Mughals, and British.

# **Shiv-Srushti project**

 The Shiv-Srushti project in Chhatrapati Sambhaji Nagar (formerly Aurangabad) is an ambitious initiative aimed at creating a cultural and spiritual complex dedicated to Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj, the revered Maratha king.





#### The project encompasses:

- 1. A grand temple:
  - Dedicated to Lord Shiva, it will be a replica of the iconic Somnath temple in Gujarat.
- 2. A museum:
  - Housing artifacts and exhibits showcasing the life and achievements of Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj and Maratha history.
- 3. Cultural center:
  - Hosting performing arts, exhibitions, and educational programs promoting Maratha culture and heritage.
- 4. Theme park:
  - Featuring rides and attractions showcasing Maratha history and values.
- 5. Open-air theater:
  - For hosting cultural events and performances.

# Western Railway's 'Coolie No 1' initiative

- In a unique initiative, the Western Railway (WR) has launched an initiative - 'Coolie No
   1'
- It is aimed towards mutual benefit of Licensed Sahayaks and passengers.

- The initiative has been started at Mumbaiheadquartered WR's Mumbai Division.
- Licensed Sahayaks (licensed porters) play an integral part in the railway system in India and add an important value in the overall train travel experience of long-distance passengers.

# **Justice Shinde Committee submits report on Maratha reservation issue**

- In a significant development vis-a-vis the Maratha vs OBC reservation issue, a committee was formed to define the Standard Operating Procedure (SOP) for issuing Kunbi-Maratha and Maratha-Kunbi certificates based on old records
- Justice Sandeep Shinde (Retd) headed the committee and has now submitted the report to the MH govt.

#### Note:

 Kunbis are a sub-caste of Marathas and are covered under Other Backward Classes (OBCs).

# Maharashtra to establish onion storage banks

- The Maharashtra government has announced that it will establish onion storage banks across the State and use nuclear technology for irradiation to extend the freshness and shelf life of the bulb crop.
- This step was initiated to ensure that onion farmers don't suffer loss due to price fluctuation and have well-equipped storage.
- Nuclear technology involves using controlled doses of ionizing radiation to make onions safe to eat by killing harmful microorganisms and extending their shelf life

# Defence Ministry signs deal for 6 next-gen OPVs for Coast Guard

- The Defence Ministry signed a ₹1,614.89 crore contract with Mazagon Dockyard Shipbuilders Limited (MDL), Mumbai.
- It is for procurement of six next-generation
   Offshore Patrol Vessels (OPV) for the Indian Coast Guard (ICG).
- Out of the six vessels being procured, four would replace the existing aging OPVs and the other two would augment the ICG fleet.





# 9 overseas firms under ED's scanner in ₹6k cr bitcoin ponzi scam

- The Enforcement Directorate is investigating nine overseas firms, including those in Hong Kong and Estonia.
- These firms were allegedly used to divert funds from a bitcoin-based ponzi scheme operated by Variable Tech.
- The scheme collected 80,000 bitcoins and diverted funds worth INR 6,606 crore (\$915 million) through the nine firms to purchase properties abroad.
- The investigation has resulted in the provisional attachment of properties worth INR 69 crore.

# New Covid-19 sub-variant JN.1 detected in Sindhudurg

- A 41-year-old man in Sindhudurg district,
   Maharashtra, has tested positive for the new COVID-19 sub-variant JN.1
- Recently, the World Health Organisation (WHO) has designated JN.1 as a 'variant of interest' due to its rapidly increasing spread.
- However, the global public health risk is considered 'low.'

# Awareness can pave the way for the Ratnagiri nuclear energy project

- Dr. Mashelkar stated that in the present scenario, nuclear energy is essential for the nation, and more power plants need to be built.
- There have been no instances of harm caused by these plants anywhere in the country.
- Thus, if the government raises awareness among the citizens, nuclear energy projects such as the one in Ratnagiri can take hold.

# **'Banganga Beautification Project'**

- The Banganga Beautification Project is a transformative initiative aimed at revitalizing the historic Banganga tank and its surrounding precinct in Mumbai
- Brihanmumbai Municipal Corporation (BMC) in collaboration with GSB Trust, a management organization of the tank is all set to give a makeover to the centuries-old

- Banganga tank, located in Walkeshwar, Malabar Hill area.
- The project seeks to enhance the area's beauty, accessibility, and cultural vibrancy while preserving its rich heritage.
- It will also help to attract tourists and facilitate religious rituals.

## US footwear opens a warehouse in Palava

- American footwear giant Sketchers has opened a national distribution centre in Mumbai as part of its expansion in the Indian market.
- The 6,00,000 sq ft facility at the Lodha Industrial and Logistics Park in Kalyan has been designed to streamline supply chain operations and can ship up to 60,000 units per day.

# Maharashtra to alter minimum age to enter school to 3 yrs from 2024

- Admission norms in Maharashtra will be updated to align with the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020
- NEP mandates that children should be six years old when entering Class I
- In view of this, MH will alter the minimum age to enter school to 3 yrs.
- This updated policy is expected to be implemented for the 2024-25 academic year.

#### Person in News: Prabhakar Mande

- Prabhakar Mande, a veteran scholar in folklore, folk culture and literature, dies in Ahmednagar
- Mande hails from Chhatrapati Sambhaji Nagar
- He was **conferred the Padma Shri** in March 2023 for his enormous contribution.
- Mande had presented more than 25 research papers on different national and international platforms.

#### **KIT hosts Smart India Hackathon**

 The Kolhapur Institute of Technology (KIT) hosted the Smart India Hackathon with the help of AICTE Delhi, the defense ministry, the environment ministry, and the Ayush ministry.



- A team of students from the Indore Institute of Science and Technology grabbed the first prize.
- The engineering students of the Indorebased college developed a 'robust human target detection and acquisition' model.
- Odisha-based Gandhi Institute of Engineering and Technology bagged the second prize for 'deep learning for terrain recognition' model.

# MH signs MoU for skill development

- An MoU was signed between the Maharashtra State Skill Development Society, the Commissionerate of Skills, Employment, Entrepreneurship and the National Skill Development Corporation
- It aims to support Maharashtra International, an international employment facility centre.

# Silver crown belonging to Tulja Bhavani temple goes missing

- A silver crown that has been in the Bhavani temple since before 2011 has been suspected to be missing from Tulja Bhavani temple's treasury.
- This silver crown was in possession of Mahant Chiloiibua.
- Additionally, other valuable antiquities such as silver jewelry, silver Trishul, and accessories made up of pearl and gold have also gone missing from the temple treasury.

#### **State News**

# Karnataka to reduce burden of school bags by 50%

- The Karnataka government has taken steps to reduce the burden of school bags by cutting 50% of textbooks for students of classes I to X from the academic year 2024-25
- Instead of providing textbooks once for the entire year, the state will give two books per year, divided into two parts, (Summative Assessment) SA-1 and SA-2.

#### **Key points**

 In 2019, a committee comprising education experts, paediatricians, doctors, legal advisers, and officials of the Department of State Education Research and Training

- **(DSERT)** conducted a study to reduce school bag burden.
- They concluded that the weight of school bags for students of class I to II could be in the range of 1.5 to 2 kg.
- For classes 3 to 5, the proposed range was 2 to 3 kg, for classes 6 to 8, the proposed range was 3 to 4 kg, and for classes 9 and 10, the recommendation was 4 to 5 kg.

# Geological Survey of India opens first camp office in A.P

- The Geological Survey of India (GSI) opened its first camp office for Andhra Pradesh in Vijayawada.
- Andhra Pradesh is one of the mineral-rich States.
- The new office will help maintain coordination with the State government on matters related to mineral exploration.

# Feeding Stations for oil spill-hit birds at creek in T.N

- After bird-life was badly hit by the recent Ennore oil spill, the TN state forest department has found close to 50 birds of different species completely 'painted' black with oil.
- Experts from the Wildlife Trust of India (WTI)
   and the Besant Memorial Animal
   Dispensary (BMAD) are planning to establish feeding stations for birds at the Ennore creek.

## **Key points**

- TN State Department of Environment, Climate Change and Forests, the nodal agency for the oil spill clean-up, has roped in WTI to work with local volunteers and the Wildlife Warden, Chennai, to assess how the affected birds could be rescued and rehabilitated.
- The team is planning to strategically set up 'cafeterias' with nets to feed the birds with fresh fish and capture those that are sick.

#### **International News**

# Along the border with Assam, Bhutan will built a sizable green

 Bhutan intends to construct a sizable "international city" that would span more than 1,000 square kilometres near its border with Assam.



- The concept was introduced as an "economic corridor connecting South Asia with Southeast Asia via India's northeastern States" by King Jigme Khesar Namgyel Wangchuck of Bhutan.
- The project includes the first railway line from India to Bhutan, which will run to Gelephu and link to roads and border crossings into West Bengal and Assam.
- The goal of the Gelephu Smart city Project is to adhere to sustainability and environmental regulations while luring top-tier investment from carefully chosen foreign businesses.
- The concept calls for the construction of Bhutan's second international airport, "zero emission" enterprises, and a "mindfulness city" with an emphasis on tourism and well-being.
- To encourage foreign investment, Gelephu will function as a "Special Administrative Region" governed by distinct legislation.

# Chief guest at the 2024 Republic Day celebrations

- French President Emmanuel Macron will be the chief guest at the 2024 Republic Day celebrations
- As Strategic Partners, India and France share a high degree of convergence on a range of regional and global issues.
- This year marks the 25th anniversary of the India-France Strategic Partnership

# China bans export of rare earth technologies

- China, the world's top processor of rare earths, banned the export of technology to extract and separate the strategic metals, as it overhauled a list of technologies deemed key to national security.
- It also banned the export of production technology for rare earth metals and alloy materials as well as technology to prepare some rare earth magnets.
- The move comes as Europe and the U.S. scramble to wean themselves off rare earths from China, which accounts for 90% of global refined output.
- Rare earths are a group of 17 metals used to make magnets for use in EVs and other electronics.

## **Economy News**

#### **Green finance**

- Green finance refers to the financial arrangements that are specific to the use for projects that are environmentally sustainable or projects that adopt the aspects of climate change.
- Environmentally sustainable projects include the production of energy from renewable sources like solar, wind, biogas, etc.; clean transportation that involves lower greenhouse gas emission; energy efficient projects like green building; waste management that includes recycling, efficient disposal and conversion to energy, etc.

- Indian men's hockey team midfielder Hardik Singh and women's side captain Savita won the FIH Player of the Year and Goalkeeper of the Year (women) awards respectively.
- This is Hardik's second big award after the Hockey India Balbir Singh Sr Award for Player of the Year 2022.
- This is Savita's third consecutive FIH
   Women's Goalkeeper of the Year award.

#### Female Athlete of the Year

- U.S. gymnast Simone Biles has been voted Associated Press' Female Athlete of the Year' for a third time.
- Her triumphant return that included her record eighth U.S. national championship and a sixth world all-around gold made Biles the fourth woman in last 50 years to claim the honour for a third time after tennis stars Serena Williams (five times), Chris Evert (four) and golfer Annika Sorenstam (three).

#### **Summits & Conferences News**

#### **Global Stocktake**

- It refers to a proposed five-year review of the impact of countries' climate change actions.
- Under the Paris Agreement, every country must present a climate action plan in five-year cycles.
- The first global stocktake was scheduled for 2023 under the Paris Agreement.
- It will assess whether the net result of the climate actions being taken was consistent with the goal of keeping the increase in global average temperature from pre-industrial times to within 2 degrees Celsius.
- It will help the world determine whether it needs to do more and how much more.
- It also recognises that money needs to be made available for Loss and Damage and energy transition in developing countries.

**Schemes and Committee News** 

#### **DevINE scheme**

- The Ministry of Development of North Eastern Region (DoNER) convened a meeting with the Chief Ministers of the States in the region
- The meeting comes in the wake of a review by the Prime Ministers Office (PMO) that found that the scheme was yet to take off despite adequate funds.

# About Prime Minister's Development Initiative for North East Region (PM-DevINE) Scheme

- It is a **Central Sector Scheme** with 100% central funding.
- It will be implemented by the Ministry of Development of North Eastern Region (DoNER).
- It will have an outlay of Rs.6,600 crore for the four year period from 2022-23 to 2025-26.
- The infrastructure projects will be funded in line with the priorities laid down under the PM Gati Shakti program.
- The objectives of PM-DevINE are to:
- Fund infrastructure convergently, in the spirit of PM Gati Shakti;
- Support social development projects based on felt needs of the NER;
- Enable livelihood activities for youth and women:
- Fill the development gaps in various sectors.

#### Palna Scheme

- The Women and Child Development Ministry aims to establish 17,000 creches in anganwadis across the country.
- The Ministry plans to depute two additional creche workers in each anganwadi.

#### **Key points**

• These initiatives are being taken under the 'Palna' scheme to address the need for quality daycare facilities or creches for children of working women by providing a safe and secure environment for the nutritional, health and cognitive development of the children, thereby enabling more women among all socio-economic groups to take up gainful employment in the organised and unorganised sector.



- According to government data, participation of women in the workforce has increased to 37% in 2022.
- As of March 31, 2021, 13.87 lakh anganwadi and mini-anganwadi centres are operational across the country.

#### **Defense News**

# Offshore patrol vessels

The Defence Ministry signed a ₹1,614.89-crore contract with Mazagon Dockyard Shipbuilders, Mumbai for procurement of six next-generation offshore patrol vessels for the Coast Guard.

#### **Key points**

- Of the six vessels being procured, four would replace the existing ageing vessels and the other two would augment the Coast Guard fleet
- These modern and high-tech ships will play a critical role in enhancing surveillance, law enforcement, search and rescue, maritime pollution response, and other important capabilities
- The vessels would be equipped with multipurpose drones and Al capability.

# India receives price bids for 26 Rafale jets, 3 submarines

- India has received price bids from France for the purchase of 26 Rafale-M carrier-based fighters as well as three additional Scorpene-class conventional submarines.
- The 26 jets are meant to fill the gap in the numbers till the indigenous Twin Engine Deck-Based Fighter is inducted into service.

#### Did you know?

- The Navy currently operates two aircraft carriers, the INS Vikramaditya and the indigenously built INS Vikrant.
- The major difference between the existing Scorpenes and the new ones is their integrated combat system (ICS).
- The earlier submarines had systems from France, while the new ones will have indigenous ICS, with significant localised solutions provided by Bharat Electronics Limited in collaboration with French suppliers.

## Ranks & Reports News

## Demand for Coal is Expected to Drop by 2026

- Despite record production, global coal demand is expected to fall by 2.3% by 2026.
- According to the IEA (International Energy Association) analysis, the reduction is due to a shift toward renewable energy and plateauing demand in China.
- India will continue to be a major driver of coal demand until 2026.
- In 2023, global coal demand is expected to increase by 1.4%, surpassing 8.5 billion tons.
- Regional variations: the EU and US forecast a 20% decline in demand, whereas India and China expect an increase.
- Between 2024 and 2026, an El Nino to La Nina change is forecast, which will benefit hydroelectric generation.

# Factors contributing to the drop include:

- low-cost solar deployment and increased nuclear generation.
- China, which accounts for more than half of global coal use, predicts a drop in 2024 and a plateau in 2026.
- Despite the drop, worldwide coal consumption is predicted to surpass 8 billion tons by 2026.
- Coal demand is declining structurally as clean energy alternatives continue to expand.

# Unemployment: a concern for the state

- The recent breach of Parliament Security is a major occurrence in the last decade.
- The assailants were either unemployed or dissatisfied with their current situation.

#### **About**

- According to a review of employment-related statistics from the Centre for Monitoring Indian Economy (CMIE), things got worse after the outbreak of Covid.
- The percentage of the working-age population employed or actively looking for work is displayed in the Labour Force Participation Rate (LFPR) report.
- Except for the pandemic years, India's overall LFPR in FY23 was 39.5%, the lowest level since at least FY17.
- It was 8.7% for women and 66% for males, the lowest percentages since at least FY17.





 Therefore, even after the epidemic, a growing percentage of Indians in their working years were neither employed nor eager to look for jobs.

# Data on Foreign tourist visits

- There has been a significant increase in the number of foreign tourists visiting India in 2023 with a footfall of 7.24 million till October compared with 6.44 million for the corresponding period in 2022.
- This is an increase of 55.6%
- The numbers though are still below the prepandemic levels.
- In 2018 and 2019, India saw 10.56 million and 10.93 million foreign tourist arrivals, respectively, which dipped to 2.74 million in 2020 and further to 1.52 million in 2021, majorly due to the COVID-induced lockdown.

#### Schemes for Financial assistance

- Swadesh Darshan 2 is the flagship scheme of the Ministry of Tourism which provides financial assistance to the State governments and Union Territories and Central agencies for the development of tourism infrastructure at various destinations.
- The Prasad (Pilgrimage Rejuvenation And Spiritual Augmentation focuses on developing and identifying pilgrimage sites across India to promote religious tourism.
- It aims to integrate pilgrimage destinations in a prioritised, planned and sustainable manner to provide a complete religious tourism experience.
- The growth of domestic tourism hugely depends on pilgrimage tourism.

## E-bus penetration in India

- CRISIL report on E-bus penetration in India was released recently
- The share of electric buses in new bus sales across India is expected to double to 8% next fiscal from 4% in the last fiscal.
- It is driven by the central government's focus on decarbonising the public transport sector and favourable total cost of ownership (TCO) for an e-bus vis-à-vis buses run on other fuels

#### **Key points**

 Efforts were underway to deploy e-buses via tenders already awarded under the Faster Adoption and Manufacturing of (Hybrid and) Electric Vehicles, or FAME, scheme and the National Electric Bus Programme (NEBP)

- Growth in e-buses is also supported by favourable ownership economics
- TCO for e-bus is estimated to be 15-20% lower than ICE and CNG bus, over an estimated life span of 15 years with breakeven in 6-7 years.

#### **Generative Al**

- A report prepared by the global accounting/consulting firm, EY highlighted that by fully capitalising Gen AI technology and its applications across sectors, the country can potentially add \$359-438 billion in FY2029-30 alone, reflecting a 5.9% to 7.2% increase over and above baseline GDP.
- Generative AI (Gen AI) has the potential to add a cumulative \$1.2-1.5 trillion to India's GDP over seven years to 2030
- Approximately 69% of the overall impact is expected to be derived from sectors such as business, services, financial services, retail and healthcare.

## India Skills Report

India Skills Report is published by talent assessment agency Wheebox in association with various agencies including All India Council for Technical Education, Confederation of Indian Industry and Association of Indian Universities.

#### According to the report,

- Kerala has emerged as the most preferred State to work in the India Skills Report 2024.
- Kochi and Thiruvananthapuram have come second and fourth respectively among cities where both men and women prefer to work regardless of their age.
- Kerala also secured the second position in overall employability among the 18-21 age group to reaffirm its status as a robust talent pool in the country.

# **Science and Technology News**

## The Era of CRISPR Therapeutics

- Exagamglogene Autotemcel was authorised by the MHRA (U.K.) to treat sickle-cell disease and thalassemia.
- It is one of the first dual-approved CRISPR medicines, having also received FDA (United States) approval for sickle-cell disease.
- This marks the beginning of a new era for millions of people suffering from genetic blood diseases such as thalassemia and sickle cell Anaemia.
- There are about a million thalassemia sufferers worldwide, with 100,000 requiring blood transfusions. Around 20 million people are affected with sickle cell anaemia.
- CRISPR technologies of the first generation are in use, with increasing efficacy and efficiency.
- Base-editing, prime editing, and epigenetic impact modification are examples of emerging approaches.
- Verve Therapeutics is experimenting with base editing to treat familial hypercholesterolemia.

#### **Touchscreen**

- A touchscreen is a surface that combines two functions: to receive inputs for a computer (say, tapping on an app) and to display the output (launching the app).
- Aside from smartphones, touchscreens are also found today on ATM machines, various household appliances (including TVs and AC panels), e-readers, billing systems, and electronic voting machines.

- The touchscreen was invented by an engineer named E.A. Johnson at the Royal Radar Establishment in Malvern, U.K., in 1965
- The two most common types of touchscreens are capacitive and resistive
- Of these, capacitive touchscreens are used in smartphones and other portable 'information appliances'.

## NaMo app

- Prime Minister launched the "Jan Man Survey" on the NaMo app with exhaustive questions on the performance of his government and that of local representatives.
- The app is at the forefront of Mr. Modi's **digital** interaction with people.
- It has more than two crore subscribers.

## **Photoreception**

- Photoreception is activation of a biological process by light.
- Most organisms, including humans, respond to light. Some animals react to light waves not perceived by humans.
- Vertebrates have two types of photosensitive cells, rods and cones, so called because of their shape.
- The rods, which are long and fat, contain large amounts of visual pigment and they mediate vision under dim illumination (scotopic vision).
- The cone cells, which are relatively small, mediate daylight vision (photopic vision) and colour sensation.
- The retinas of diurnal animals have localised areas with a high density of cone cells. (The eyes of most birds have two such areas.)
- In nocturnal animals, the retina is mainly made up of rod cells. Rhodopsin, a photosensitive pigment present in rods, is decolourised by photons (light particles) and slowly regenerated in the dark. This ensures better vision for them in dim light.

# WHO prequalifies a malaria vaccine by Serum Institute

- The World Health Organization (WHO) added the R21/Matrix-M malaria vaccine to its list of pregualified vaccines.
- It is developed by Oxford University and manufactured by Serum Institute of India.



- In October 2023, the WHO had recommended its use for the prevention of malaria in children.
- The R21 vaccine is the **second malaria** vaccine prequalified by the WHO.

# **Key points**

- The prequalification means larger access to vaccines as a key tool to prevent malaria in children, with it being a prerequisite for vaccine procurement by UNICEF and funding support for deployment by Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance.
- It added that both vaccines have been shown to be safe and effective in clinical trials, for preventing malaria in children.

## Did you know?

- Malaria, a mosquito-borne disease, places a particularly high burden on children in the African region, where nearly half a million children die from the disease each year.
- In 2022, there were an estimated 249 million malaria cases in the world, and 6,08,000 malaria deaths across 85 countries.

# **International Migrants Day**

- International Migrants Day is celebrated on 18 December.
- On this International Migrants Day, IOM aims to position migration as one of the solutions to global challenges, such as adapting to the impacts of climate change or providing better economic opportunities for communities.
- The theme for the 2023 is "Act today for a better tomorrow for all: Improving the health of migrants to unleash the power of migration"

# First winter Arctic expedition

- The Raman Research Institute (RRI) is participating in the first winter Indian expedition to the Arctic region.
- The institute researchers would examine the characterisation of the radio frequency environment in the Svalbard region of the Arctic in Norway.
- The survey will help astronomers assess the suitability of this uniquely located region for carrying out precision astronomy measurements.

#### **Key points**

- India has been running its own research station, Himadri, in Svalbard since 2008.
- The winter expedition is a bid to maintain a year-long presence at the station.
- The month-long scientific expedition is being funded by the Earth Sciences Ministry.
- The National Centre for Polar and Ocean Research, Goa, is the nodal agency spearheading the expedition

#### JN.1 variant

- The Union Health Ministry has asked all States to maintain a constant vigilance over the COVID-19 situation in the country in view of the upcoming festive season and the recent surge in cases in some parts of the country.
- The alert comes following the detection of the country's first case of the new JN.1 variant of COVID-19 in Kerala.

## No job quota for people with blood disorders

People with blood disorders such as thalassemia, haemophilia and sickle cell disease are not eligible for reservation in government jobs under the Persons with Disabilities category.

#### **Key points**

- The three diseases were included on the list of disabilities under the Right to Persons with Disabilities Act of 2016
- Under Section 34 of the law, "persons with blood disorders including Thalassemia are not eligible for reservation in jobs in government establishments".
- A 4% quota in government jobs was available for those with no vision and low vision; no hearing and low hearing; locomotor disability, including cerebral palsy; leprosy cured; dwarfism; muscular dystrophy; autism, and intellectual disability; acid attack victims; and others.

# Volcano erupts in southwest Iceland

- A volcano erupted close to an Iceland power plant after weeks of intense seismic activity southwest of Reykjavik.
- The eruption was only 3-km from the evacuated fishing port of Grindavik on the Reykjanes peninsula.





#### **NGC 2210**

- The densely packed globular cluster is known as NGC 2210
- It is in the Large Magellanic Cloud (LMC).
- The LMC is about 157,000 light-years from earth, and is a satellite galaxy of the Milky Way, meaning that the two galaxies are gravitationally bound.

#### **Mohini Giri**

Former chair of the **National Commission for Women and Padma Bhushan awardee** Dr. V. Mohini Giri passed away

#### About

- She was an iconic women's rights activist
- She founded the Guild of Service in 1979, which was dedicated to empowering women, underprivileged children and war widows.
- Dr. Giri was the founder trustee of Women's Initiative for Peace in South Asia and trustee of various organisations.

## Namdapha flying squirrel

- A nocturnal flying squirrel has resurfaced in Arunachal Pradesh after going missing for 42 years.
- The Namdapha flying squirrel (Biswamoyopterus biswasi) was last described in 1981 based on a single individual found in the 1,985 sq. km. Namdapha Tiger Reserve in Arunachal Pradesh's Changlang district.

## **About Namdapha Flying Squirrel**

- IUCN Status: CR
- Wildlife Protection Act Status: Schedule II
- Found in Arunachal Pradesh in the Namdapha National Park
- It is among the 25 "most wanted lost" species that are the focus of Global Wildlife Conservation's "Search for Lost Species" initiative.

#### One-stop health sector regulator

 The Central government is exploring setting up a health sector regulator that will bring private and government health insurance schemes under its purview to facilitate affordable insurance coverage for all

- The Ministries of Finance (MoF) and Health are in "initial discussions" over the need for a sector watchdog.
- Doctors' bodies have urged that private and government insurance be brought under a single regulator. Meaning, regulating government schemes like Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana, the Central Government Health Scheme, Employees' State Insurance Corporation, etc.
