(Specify proper points for determination and give reasons for your conclusion on each point for determination. Conclude the judgment by proper and final order).

The informant had parked his motor cycle in front of his shop. After closing the shop in the night, he found his motor cycle missing from the parking area. He lodged report with the police station. During investigation, police found the motor cycle parked in the court yard of the house of accused. The accused failed to give satisfactory account of the vehicle in his possession. Police seized the vehicle in the presence of Panchas and prepared the panchanama. Police filed charge sheet against accused for the offence punishable u/s. 379 of the IPC.

The defence of accused is of total denial. He also denied the seizure of the vehicle from his possession.

In the evidence the informant and the Investigating Officer supported the prosecution, whereas the Panch witnesses to the seizure did not support prosecution.
