Discovery of New Jumping SpiderSpecies by ZSI	 Context: The Zoological Survey of India (ZSI) researchers have recently identified four previously unknown species of jumping spiders. These discoveries span various locations across the country, with one being found in Bengal. About: The newly identified species belong to the genus Phintella and are named P. dentis, P. handersoni, P. luna, and P. Rajbharathi. Phintella luna, found in West Bengal and Andhra Pradesh, is particularly noteworthy. It has been named 'luna' due to its copulatory ducts resembling the moon. The species Phintella dentis, discovered in Mookambika Wildlife Sanctuary, Karnataka, earned its name because of distinctive cheliceral teeth. Phintella nadersoni, located in the Anderson Tea Estate of Meghalaya, is named in honor of the late Handerson Syiemlieh, the owner of the estate. Diversity of Genus Phintella The genus Phintella, part of the jumping spider family 'Salticidae,' is known for its diversity. It currently includes 76 described species, with 18 originating from India. These small spiders are adorned with colorful, iridescent scales and are commonly found in the Old World and Australia.

Crocodile Census in Sunderbans	 Context: An extensive exercise is underway in the Sunderbans, a delta region, to assess the population of the estuarine crocodile (Crocodylus porosus), the largest living reptile globally, which dominates the brackish waters. This survey, occurring after a 12-year gap since the last one in 2012, aims to provide insights into the top predator's population dynamics. Crocodile Characteristics and Importance The estuarine crocodile, inhabiting eastern India, Southeast Asia, and northern Australia, is recognized for its size, with males reaching up to 20 feet and weighing over 1,000kg. In the Sunderbans, their average length is approximately 12 feet. These crocodiles exhibit high salinity tolerance, making them well-suited for brackish waters, the ideal habitat. IUCN Conservation status: Least Concern Covered under Schedule I of Wildlife Act,1972
