Minimum support price (MSP)	<ul> <li>Why in the news?</li> <li>The government has increased the minimum support price (MSP) for paddy by 5.35%, setting it at ₹2,300 per quintal for the 2024-25 kharif marketing season, effective</li> </ul>
	from June 19.
	<ul> <li>About MSP:</li> <li>MSP is a form of market intervention by the government to insure agricultural producers against any sharp fall in farm prices.</li> <li>Objective: To provide a guaranteed price and assured market to the farmers, protecting them from the fluctuations in the market prices.</li> <li>Fixation Authority: The MSP is announced by the Government of India at the beginning of the sowing season for certain crops based on the recommendations of the Commission for Agricultural Costs and Prices (CACP).</li> <li>Coverage: MSP is announced for 23 crops, including cereals (paddy, wheat, barley, jowar, bajra, maize, ragi), pulses (gram, arhar/tur, moong, urad, lentil), oilseeds (groundnut, rapeseed-mustard, soyabean, sesamum, sunflower, safflower, nigerseed), commercial crops (cotton, sugarcane, copra), and others (jute, tobacco).</li> <li>Criteria for Determination: <ul> <li>Cost of production</li> <li>Changes in input prices</li> <li>Market price trends</li> <li>Demand and supply</li> <li>Inter-crop price parity</li> <li>Terms of trade between agriculture and non-agriculture sectors</li> <li>A minimum of 50% margin over the cost of production</li> </ul> </li> </ul>
	Implementation:
	<ul> <li>The MSP is implemented through procurement agencies like the Food Corporation of India (FCI) and state agencies.</li> <li>They buy crops from farmers at the MSP, ensuring they get the announced support price.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Purpose:</li> <li>To stabilize farmer's income.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>To incentivize the farmers to adopt new technologies and modern agricultural practices.</li> <li>To ensure <b>food security</b> by stabilizing supply.</li> </ul>
